power away to the Executive," he warned. "At this hour, when we stand on the threshold of a new, free world to be erected after the United Nations have won their victory, Congress must retain its power to regulate foreign commerce, its power to levy taxes, and the Senate must retain some supervision over international agreements, or else the people themselves will have been excluded from the reorganization that is to come."

The people of 22 out of the 26 countries with which trade agreements have been made retain legislative supervision over these agreements, Senator O'Mahoney said, in urging approval of his amendment. "It is folly to say that such an

amendment would create misunderstanding anywhere in the world," he asserted. "The countries of Latin America, whose legislators retain the power I am asking Congress to retain, will not resent it if we put our legislative body on an equal basis with theirs. The British government, the Canadian government, both of which retain parliamentary superiority, will not resent it if our Congress says that it will exercise the same function that their legislative bodies exercise."

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### Departing Nazi Envoy Is Feted in Tokio

Foreign Minister Gives Farewell Dinner for Ott

The Tokio radio reported today in a broadcast recorded by the Associated Press that Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu had entertained Maj. Gen. Eugen Ott, former German Ambassador to Japan, at a farewell dinner prior to the latter's departure for Germany.

Little has been heard of Ott since

a Berlin broadcast last January 2 announced that he was being recalled in a diplomatic shake-up which also involved a change in the German representatives in Spain and Sweden.

London sources interpreted Ott's recall as an indication of German displeasure at the failure of Japan to hit at Russia through Siberia at a time when Germany was taking a severe pounding on the Soviet front.

Ott's successor, Heinrich Georg Stahmer, was reported to have arrived in Tokio on February 3 and presented his credentials to Emperor Hirohito.

At the time Ott's recall was announced the German radio said he would be given a new post in the Foreign Office in Berlin.

### Legislative Surrender Threatens Democracy, O'Mahoney Declares

Senator, in Forum, Calls for Veto Power Over Trade Pacts

Asserting that "the surrender of legislative power to the executive by wholesale votes in the Senate and House threatens the American system of government," Senator O'Mahoney, Democrat of Wyoming, urged last night that Congress be given a veto power over reciprocal trade agreements.

In addressing the National Radio Forum, arranged by The Star and broadcast over WMAL and the Blue Network, he declared Congress had been gradually giving away its legislative power to boards and commissions which it has itself created, and that these now constitute "an executive bureaucracy that threatens the very existence of our traditional system of government."

The Wyoming Senator has introduced in the Senate an amendment to the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act which provides that no agreement shall be effective until it receives the approval of Congress.

Bill Raises Two Questions.

The bill now pending in the Senate to extend the Trade Agreements Act shows the extent to which Congress has abdicated its legislative powers, Senator O'Mahoney said.

"Two separate and distinct questions are raised in this bill," he continued. "The first involves only the issue as to whether or not reciprocity in international trade is a desirable policy. That is the question to which public attention has been chiefly directed. If it were the only question involved, I doubt whether there would be any serious debate in Congress at all over this policy."

"The question which is involved, however, and which makes the proposal to extend the act one of the most important domestic issues of our time, is whether and to what degree the Congress should surrender its legislative powers to the executive."

Involve Congressional Functions.

Because it is an international agreement, a trade agreement, he said, takes on certain aspects of a treaty, and treaties, under the Constitution, must be ratified by the Senate. Because it deals with tariffs and imports duties, a trade agreement also has some of the aspects of a revenue bill, which under the Constitution, must originate in the House, he said, adding that because it affects international trade, a trade agreement is a regulation of commerce with foreign nations, a power given explicitly to Congress by the Constitution.

"So here three great powers which, under the American system of government, belong to the people through their representatives, are surrendered by the Congress and transferred to the executive," Senator O'Mahoney told his radio audience.

"It is the blindness of Congress to the nature of the surrender it is making that appalls me. Wherever we look in the world, save only in Great Britain and the British Commonwealth of Nations, parliamentary power has been vanishing and upon the wreckage of the legislative system has arisen the structure of totalitarian dictatorship."

During the last two weeks, he continued, the press of the country has been virtually unanimous in protest-

ing against the exclusion of newspaper reporters from the food conference at Hot Springs, Va.

"It may be doubted whether the Constitution grants to every correspondent the right to attend international conferences of this kind," he declared, "but there can be no doubt that the Constitution places upon the shoulders of every member of Congress the responsibility of regulating commerce and fixing tariff rates."

"But Congress yields its power while the press vigorously defends its privileges. If the Congress should pattern itself on the virility of the press and defend its power, the steady expansion of bureaucracy would not be the problem that it is today in America."

"We cannot preserve representative government in the United States if Congress continues to throw its

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British King Makes Eisenhower and MacArthur Knights

Highest Rank in Order of Bath Given for Services to Allies

By the Associated Press. LONDON, May 27.—King George VI today bestowed on Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Douglas MacArthur the honorary rank of knights, Grand Cross, of the Order of the Bath, military division.

Gen. Eisenhower, Allied commander in chief in North Africa, and Gen. MacArthur, commander in chief of the Southwest Pacific, were honored "in recognition of most valuable services in command of troops of the Allied Nations."

In the case of British citizens these appointments would permit the generals the title "sir," but American citizens holding office are forbidden by the Constitution from accepting foreign titles without the consent of Congress.

Pershing Similarly Honored. Gen. John J. Pershing, commander in chief of the AEF in the World War, was honored similarly by King George VI.

London noted that the appointments were made simultaneously and without distinction between the commanders in major theaters of American interest.

The appointments implied political as well as royal recognition for the services of the two generals, since such appointments are made by the king only on the advice or consent of his ministers.

The Order of the Bath is the senior order of British knighthood which has a military division. The rank of knight, grand cross, is the order's first class.

Will Receive Gold Collar. It is held by such top-ranking British commanders as Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, deputy commander in chief in North Africa, and Field Marshal Sir Archibald W. Wavell, commander in chief in India.

The American generals will be presented the insignia of the order, a 30-ounce gold collar with nine imperial crowns, but will not receive the accolade—that is, they will not kneel before the King and be dubbed knight.

The Order of the Bath was created in 1399, but subsequently lapsed and was revived in 1725. On ceremonial occasions its members are entitled to wear a scarlet-lined mantle covering them from neck to toe.

MacArthur Says Honor Reflects on Comrades. ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, May 27 (AP).—Gen. Douglas MacArthur, commenting today on his appointment as a knight, grand cross, of the Order of the Bath, said the honor reflected primarily on his "comrades in arms" in the Southwest Pacific.

Col. T. W. Hasteley Assumes Command at Bolling Field

Former Enlisted Man Began Air Career In Army in 1918

Col. Thomas W. Hasteley, 50, of Chipley, Ga., is the new commanding officer of the Bolling Field Army Air Base, having taken over late yesterday after relinquishing duties as chief of staff of the Antilles Air Task Force in the Caribbean.

He succeeds Col. Lewis R. Parker, whose new assignment the War Department has not yet announced. The new Bolling Field commander came up the hard way in the Army.

He enlisted in 1912 and for 31 years has served at home and overseas. Col. Hasteley is married and the father of two children, a 16-year-old son who is attending the New Mexican Military Institute at Roswell, N. Mex., and a daughter, 11.

Col. Hasteley began studying aerial observation in 1918 at Fort Sill, Okla. After further training in aerial gunnery, he was assigned to the 190th Aero Squadron in Texas.

He was promoted to captain in the Air Corps on July 20, the same day he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the corps. His duties later included three years in Washington with the training and operations divisions of the general staff.

Transferred to the Philippines in 1929, he spent two years at Nichols Field as post commander and commander of the 28th Bombardment Group. Returning to the United States he was stationed at Randolph Field, Tex., as executive officer of the Gulf Coast Training Center.

Col. Hasteley was assigned to Bolling Field, Tex., as executive officer of the Gulf Coast Training Center and later as officer in charge of elementary flying at civilian training schools. He was assigned later to the 4th Air Force after a brief tour of duty at the 4th Corps Area, Atlanta, Ga.

Col. Hasteley was promoted to colonel in 1941. He holds the flying ratings of command pilot and combat observer. He is the son of a farmer.

Man in Speeding Car Disappears During Chase by Police

Companion Captured, Another Auto Eludes Pursuing Scout Car

District and Maryland police are a little confused as to how it all happened, but they know they did a lot of 75-mile-an-hour chasing, arresting one suspect and having another suspect vanish mysteriously from a speeding automobile—which turned out to be a different car from the one they first began to chase.

It all began at North Capitol and Decatur streets early today when two policemen in scout car 21 spotted two men siphoning gasoline from a car.

When the men saw the police they jumped into a sedan and roared off, with the scout car hot on their trail.

Shortly after receiving the call, Policemen A. E. Sweeney and James G. Beach were driving in scout 122 at South Dakota avenue and Bladensburg road N.E., when a car with two men sped by them.

Believing them to be the suspects wanted by scout 21, scout 122 took up the chase.

Down Bladensburg road, across the District line and into Maryland the two cars sped. At Peace Cross, the car made a right turn, just as a Prince Georges County police car joined the chase.

At Cheverly, Md., the fleeing car almost hit a pedestrian.

The fleeing car made a quick turn at Cheverly and soon was heading back toward the District. Scout 122 and the Maryland squad car were about to close in when the car made a desperate turn—into a dead-end street, where it came to a stop.

The policemen had never lost sight of the car long enough for any one to jump. But, when the car came to a stop, only one man was in it.

The suspect refused to say where his companion was and accented his refusal, police said, by striking Mr. Sweeney.

Maryland police charged the suspect with: Driving while drunk; failing to slow down when approaching a pedestrian; speeding—more than 70 miles an hour; extinguishing lights to avoid arrest; assault and battery on a police officer, and disorderly conduct.

He was being held in lieu of \$3,500 bond.

Capone Aides Abandon Fight Against Removal

By the Associated Press. CHICAGO, May 27.—Six former associates of Al Capone yesterday abandoned their fight against removal to New York on charges of extorting more than \$1,000,000 from movie companies after they were assured they would not be tried until next fall.

The twofold agreement covering those points was reached by Government and defense attorneys and brought an unexpected end to a removal hearing before United States Commissioner E. K. Walker.

The Chicagoans agreed to appear in New York June 8 for arraignment and pleas, with the understanding that they would stand trial on September 7 or thereafter. The arrangement, Defense Counsel A. Bradley Eben said, would give them time to "prepare for a successful defense."

The indictments charged that the defendants conspired with George E. Browne and Willie Bluff, and that they extorted money from film executives and members of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees during an eight-year period.

Browne and Bluff were the actual boss of the IATSE before they were sent to prison. The defendants are Frank Diamond, Louis "Little New York" Campagna, Paul "The Walter" Ricca, Charles Gioe, Ralph Pierce and Phil D'Adrea.

Girl, 18, Is Killed In Crash of Trucks Dorothy Garbin, 18, of Roanoke Rapids, N. C., was killed instantly early today on Route 1 two miles south of Woodbridge, Va., when a truck in which she was a passenger crashed into the rear of a parked truck.

Virginia State police reported. Police said Alma Jones, 18, also of Roanoke Rapids, another passenger in the truck, escaped with slight injuries. The driver, James W. White, 18, of Windsor, N. C., was not injured.

**Nazi Military Takes Complete Control of All French Industry**

Every Operation in Production Subject To German Approval

The Nazi military government has made complete its control of the industrial economy of Occupied France through an ordinance governing "the means of production," the Office of War Information reported last night.  
The OWI released the text of the ordinance, signed by Field Marshal Gerd von Rundstedt and issued May 27 and published in the Nazi-controlled Petit Comtois at Besancon. Through it the Nazis have taken complete control of all industrial concerns under the threat of fines, imprisonment, and confiscation of properties, the OWI said.  
Under the terms of Von Rundstedt's order every operation relating to the production in industrial enterprises "can be carried out only with the authorization of the military commander in France or by an agency empowered by him for this purpose."

**Nazi Speed Transfer Of War Plants Eastward**

LONDON, May 26 (AP).—The Allied air offensive in Western Europe is forcing Germany to speed up the transfer of many of her war industries, particularly aircraft factories, to Southeastern Europe, a spokesman for the Ministry of Economic Warfare said today.

**Vatican Denounces Germans' Charge It Unleashed War**

Radio Denies Paris Broadcast, Calls Claims 'Propaganda'

NEW YORK, May 27.—The Office of War Information reported today that the Vatican radio had denounced as "propaganda" an assertion by the Nazi-controlled Paris radio last Sunday that the Catholic Church had a "crushing responsibility in unleashing the present war."  
The Vatican broadcast, which the OWI said was in the German language and directed to the German people, declared it was "impossible to see" how such assertions could be useful "even for purposes of propaganda," but added:  
"One thing is certain—it is not the Vatican which has declared this war and it is not the Catholic Church in Germany which has brought this,

her fate, upon herself. Every one knows that."  
Envoies Cited.  
Referring to the Paris broadcast made by a speaker identified as a Dr. Friedrich, who said Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering had given "order to combat any political activity of the clergy" in Germany because "many German Catholics" had waged "an open fight" against Nazism, the Vatican radio commented:  
"To this our reply is briefly this—the attitude of the Catholic Church to National Socialism as a philosophy is known in the first place through the papal encyclical 'Mit Brennender Sorge.'"

**Jury Disagrees in Suit On 'Snow White' Records**

NEW YORK, May 27.—A Supreme Court jury yesterday disagreed in a \$300,000 suit brought against the RCA Manufacturing Co. by Adriana Caselotti, voice of Snow White, and Harry Stockwell, voice of the prince in Walt Disney's movie "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs."  
Benjamin Shivers, attorney for Mr. Stockwell and Miss Caselotti, said he would seek a new trial of the charges that phonograph records were made of songs in the cartoon feature film and that "several million records were sold" in violation of what his clients said was an agreement to render "songs and dialogue for the picture only."  
The action, in which Miss Caselotti sought \$200,000 and Mr. Stockwell \$100,000, went on trial May 17, and during its course, some of the recordings were played in court.  
The RCA Co. claimed daily payment vouchers signed by both plaintiffs contained releases giving the producers all rights to voice production.

Mr. Alexion charged in his resolution that Mr. Lewis had utilized the "strike weapon" in violation of the anti-strike pledge.

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**Four Union Leaders Make Successive Calls at White House**

**Murray Says He Asked For Labor Representative On WMC, WPB**

By the Associated Press. With emphasis on economic problems, President Roosevelt survived labor matters today at four successive White House conferences.

Phillip Murray, president of the CIO, said he had been called in to "discuss the general economic situation here, particularly as it relates to wages, manpower and war production."

George Harrison, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks and also of the Railway Labor Executives' Association, came in apparently to talk over recommendations of a special fact-finding board for an increase of 8 cents an hour in pay for more than 1,000,000 railway employees.

David B. Robertson, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, saw the Chief Executive about another panel's recommendations, which he called "very unsatisfactory," pertaining to wages and helpers for men operating Diesel engines.

Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, secretary of the CIO-AFL Labor War Board, also was on the presidential calling list, but she did not discuss the nature of her conference.

Mr. Murray told reporters he had presented to the Chief Executive proposals adopted by the Executive Board and Policy Committee of the CIO in meetings at Cleveland and that Mr. Roosevelt had them under advisement and would take them up with various agencies concerned.

With regard to manpower, Mr. Murray said he asked for labor representation on the War Manpower Commission, creation of more labor-management committees in the war production setup, and a labor vice chairman for WPB.

Mr. Harrison, commenting on the wage boost recommended for non-operating rail workers, told reporters:

"I think you can say railway labor is disappointed that the increase isn't larger, but the whole matter will be accepted and we'll go on doing everything we can to contribute to the prosecution of the war."

Mr. Bloomfield, who lives at 6322 Utah avenue N.W., also is a member of the Board of Directors of the association. He had been employed by the Public Health Service for approximately 23 years.

Other officers of the organization selected at last night's meeting were: E. C. Barnes, East Pittsburgh, Pa., secretary, and J. B. Littlefield, Chicago, treasurer. The newly-elected officers will be installed at the 1944 annual meeting.

**Rubber Scrap Drive Halts As Reserves Pile Up Here**

The District rubber collective drive has been abandoned temporarily due to large reserves of the scrap here. James E. Colliflower, chairman of the District Salvage Committee, announced yesterday.

Persons were asked, however, to save scrap rubber until the time when it will be needed. A total of 211,379 pounds of scrap rubber was collected in April.

Meanwhile, it was announced that a total of 15,180,706 pounds of salvage material (grease, rubber, metal, etc.) were turned in during April. Housewives turned in a total of 43,055 pounds of fat drippings during the same month.

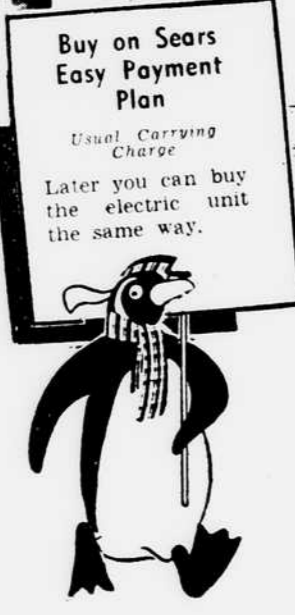
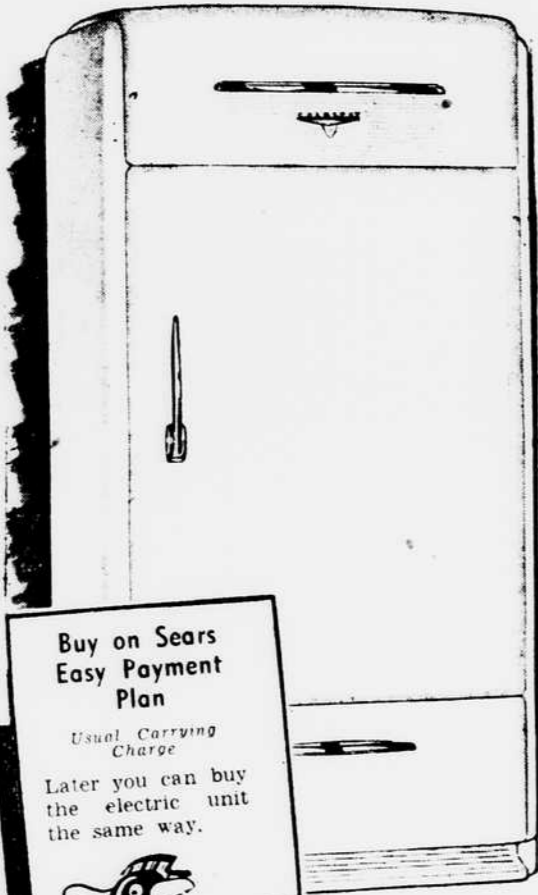

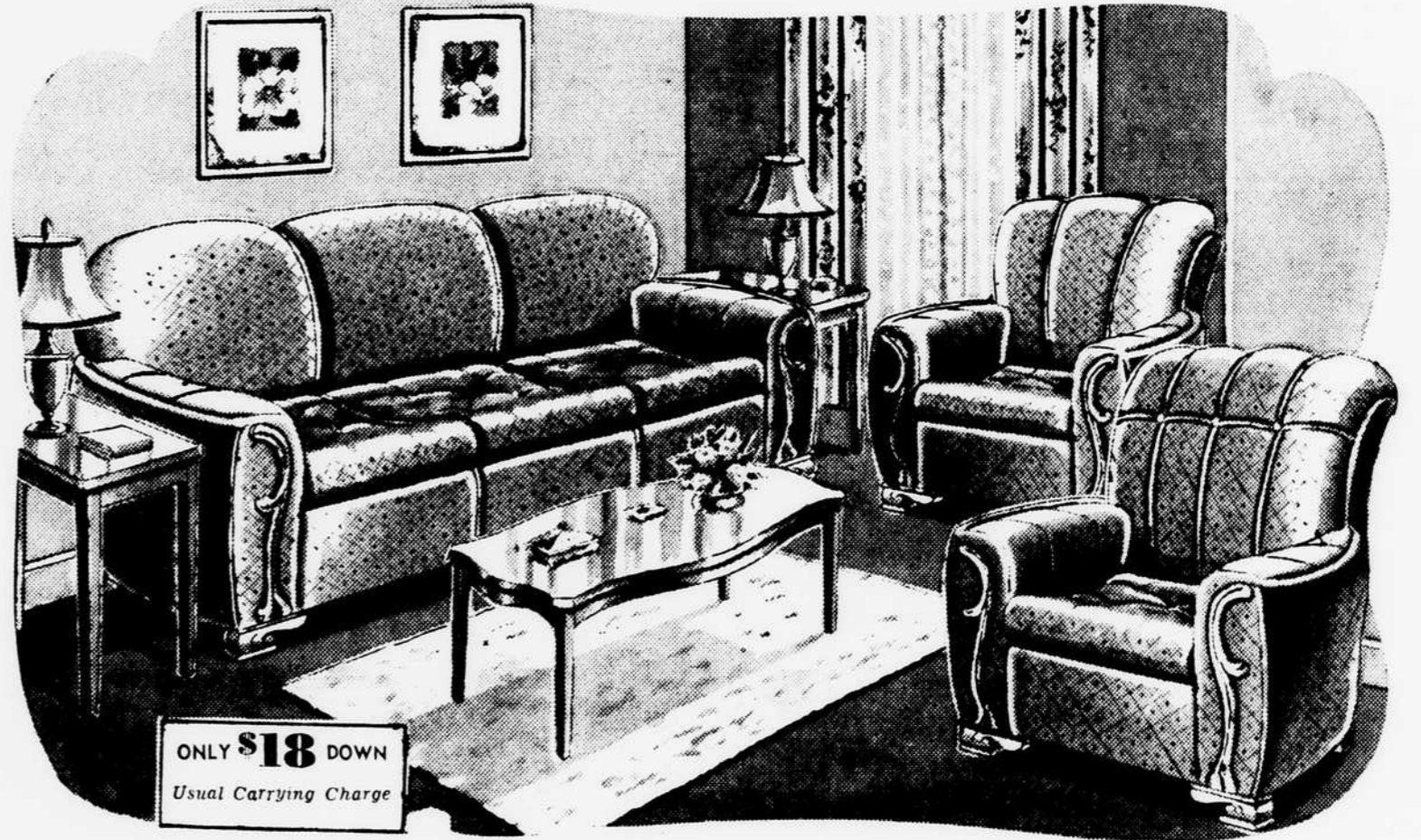

### Flood Area Farmers Return to Homes to Reshape Crop Plans

Thousands Remain In Refugee Shelters In Periled Sections

By the Associated Press.

Farm families in parts of the six-State Midwest flood zone, evacuated after rising waters from scores of rivers threatened their lives, were returning to water-damaged homes and inundated lands today to re-reshape their crop production programs.

Thousands, however, remained in refugee shelters, mostly in Southern Illinois and Eastern Missouri. More than 160,000 persons were driven from their homes by the floods. Other thousands in communities along the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers still were plagued by the two surging streams. The situation in many river towns, although somewhat improved, remained critical, Army engineers said.

As the farmers in many areas surveyed damage to crops and property from the worst flood since 1937, an emergency conference of Federal officials and representatives of the six States affected by the flood met in St. Louis. The meeting, called by Food Administration Chester C. Davis, mapped plans for prompt restoration of farm production in the 3,651,000 acres of water-covered land in Illinois, Missouri, Indiana, Oklahoma, Kansas and Arkansas. Crop and property damage has been estimated in the millions of dollars.

Although conditions along the Mis-

issippi south of St. Louis still held the attention of soldiers and engineers. The river continued to drop at the Missouri metropolis, touching 37.7 feet last night, a drop of 7 of a foot in 24 hours.

The Mississippi at Cape Girardeau, Mo., reached 42.3 feet this morning, topping the record of 42.19 which had stood since 1844. But only the lower part of the city, already flooded, was affected. Workmen continued sandbagging the city's electric plant and power was maintained. The only other industry in danger was the Marquette cement plant.

In the Wolf Lake (Ill.) district, 125 miles south of St. Louis, the Mississippi's overflow swept into the Atlas Powder Co. plant yesterday and production was halted.

On the Illinois River Beardstown remained in danger as the waters of its concrete seawall built to withstand a 30-foot flood stage. Sandbags have been stacked along the top of the barrier. With 5,500 of the town's 6,500 inhabitants evacuated, 1,000 Army and defense workers guarded the protective barriers.

The extensive damage in the six States was disclosed at the St. Louis meeting. In Illinois 1,000,000 acres of land were inundated, including 191,000 acres of corn, 70,000 of oats, 63,000 of hay and 40,000 in other crops. The remainder flooded is prairie land.

Oklahoma's flooded land totaled 809,000 acres, including 291,000 acres of corn, 244,000 of cotton, 137,000 of grain, 118,000 of peanuts and 21,000 of miscellaneous crops.

Other States' Damage.

In the other four States the damage was reported as follows:

Missouri—442,000 acres flooded, including 112,000 acres of corn, 71,000 of wheat, 57,000 of hay, 31,000 of oats, 26,000 cotton and 7,500 of barley.

Arkansas—300,000 acres flooded, 30 per cent cotton, 40 per cent corn and

Kansas (including tornado damage)—300,000 acres, including 45,000 corn, 40,000 of wheat, 35,000 of oats and 20,000 of flax.

Indiana—700,000 acres flooded, 400,000 cropland.

**Lawmaker Sees Peak Of \$300,000,000,000; Fears Inflation**

In an expected \$300,000,000,000 national debt, which represents "twice the assessed valuation of every piece of property in the United States," the District's share is \$1,310,521,298, or 104 per cent of the assessed valuation of \$1,451,303,000, based on 1940 population figures, Representative Engel, Republican, of Michigan told the House today.

Figuring from the 1940 census, which gives Washington a population of 663,091, the national debt burden for every man, woman and child in the Capital will be \$2278, according to the figures quoted by Mr. Engel.

Made 4,500-Mile Trip.

He is a member of the subcommittee which handles appropriations for the War Department and made his speech to the House after visiting 47 defense plants on a tour of 4,500 miles in two months for the purpose of examining and studying cost sheets related to the war effort.

He described his purpose "to bring home to the people just what a \$300,000,000,000 national debt will mean to them."

The share of the District in comparison with the assessed valuation of property is considerably less than that of most of the 48 States, according to Mr. Engel's figures.

"We are talking glibly about a national debt which will reach or may exceed \$300,000,000,000," said Mr. Engel. "The war is costing us many times what it is costing England or Russia, and when it is over we will be burdened with the greatest national debt in the history of the world."

Says People Don't Understand.

Emphasizing his purpose to make the people realize what this means to them, he said "the real part is the people themselves cannot understand just what a \$300,000,000,000 national debt will mean.

"If the average individual knew his demand for economy, both in and outside the war effort, his insistence upon obtaining value received for his tax dollar, would be irresistible upon the executive and legislative branches of the Government."

"I hope the publication of these figures will make the people more persistent in their demands for elimination of waste and excessive costs."

"Rumors of inflation" is inevitable unless the Government puts the brakes on spending, Mr. Engel declared.

"The time has come when we can and must stop throwing money out the window or down a rat hole," Mr. Engel said.

Warns Against Inflation.

"I have come to the conclusion," he said, "that our ability as a Nation to meet our financial obligations of the future will depend upon the policy we now follow in our expenditures."

"Second, that it is absolutely essential that public consciousness of this debt should be awakened in order that we might eliminate some of the excess costs due to various causes in our production program, and third, that only by eliminating such excess costs can we hope to avoid the rumors of inflation."

American Military Impressed by Ability And Teamwork of British Conferes Here

By CONSTANTINE BROWN. Now that Prime Minister Churchill and his large staff of experts and advisers have completed their mission in America and are returning to their country to put into effect the decisions reached in Washington, all those who have seen them at work are full of praise for their extreme efficiency and teamwork.



Pacific Front at Fore. As is inevitable in all general staff conversations among the military representatives of two nations, there have been arguments regarding the various battlefronts and what type of preparations should be undertaken.

Switched Point of View. From the moment they became convinced of the soundness of our military judgment, they played ball with us and espoused our cause as much as the conditions on the European fronts would permit.

Now "Daringly Cautious." Having paid the penalty of failure in the past, Mr. Churchill has now become a "daringly-cautious" man. That is to say, he is still full of ideas and impulses, but knows how to curb them when presented with cold facts.

Teamwork between the Prime Minister and Britain's top military men is perfect. Mr. Churchill does not presume to dictate to them, even though some of their decisions appear at first opposed to his own ideas.

Britain's military men fully are aware that in a global war the fund still existed when he died it was to be administered in accordance with instructions which previously had been given.

Propaganda Effective. One of the vital factors in the debacle was the propaganda shells. When the shells exploded, they scattered leaflets telling the Axis soldiers that they were doomed unless they quit and that 15 minutes after reading the leaflets they would be subjected to a merciless barrage.

The 8th Army men are superb. Hard as a whalebone from many years of eating in the desert, they fear nothing. They don't look like fighters. Most of them are short, wizened, bandy-legged little fellows, but they know how to handle a bayonet which is another thing that the supreme Nordic German fears.

But I wasn't alone," he said. "I have yet to meet a soldier, no matter what his rank, who didn't feel exactly as I did. When Jerry is shooting at you, the main thing is to keep alive. When you have accomplished that, nothing else seems to matter for the moment. But it is very hard to kill a good soldier and our American boys who fought through the campaign in Tunisia are the best soldiers in the world today, and they will stay alive long after the Nazi nightmare is forgotten in history."

**Navy Drills Habits  
Of Killing Technique  
Into Flyers' Minds**

Win With First Burst  
Is Principle Taught  
At Pensacola Station

By WILLIAM J. WHEATLEY,

UNITED STATES NAVAL AIR TRAINING CENTER, Pensacola, Fla., May 27.—Under revolutionary methods adopted here the habit-forming system of killing is going on hand and hand with the flight training so that the American youngster who meets his adversary in combat will not have to figure out mathematically courses, ranges, flying speed and such other data as he might need to write out the enemy's death warrant.

Most elaborate and intricate instruments have been developed which simulate as near as possible the actual conditions which will be found in combat to drill into these future birdmen here the practice of getting in the death-dealing lick first. And they have constantly hammered into them from the time they arrive from the pre-flight and primary training schools until they get their wings that they must get in the first fatal shot if they expect to live through the war.

They are given no idea that the adversary is an easy prey. They are being taught here by officers who have been in the fray at Guadalcanal, Tulagi, Macassar Strait, Midway and other points in the South Pacific, as well as Casablanca. They wear on their uniforms the various combat ribbons and the stars which mark them as heroes with citations on their records for jobs well done.

Under Admiral Murray. Their destiny, too, is under the direction of a fighting airman. Rear Admiral George D. Murray, who before he came here commanded in the fighting area of the Pacific what he calls "fighter's" carrier of the United States Navy.

The whole purpose of the station here cannot be better described than by a large sign in the colors of the Navy, gold letters on a blue background, at the entrance to the gunnery school, which collectively designate it as the "College of Mortuary Science."

Here the gunners are taught with moving pictures and scaled guns and ranges to fire straight and true at an enemy aircraft as soon as he comes into view.

Traveling hand and hand with the main object of downing aircraft and killing enemy personnel goes a course to the airman on how to save their own lives if they do not happen to get in the first and only shot. In this course, they are impressed with the fact that while planes, ships and guns can be replaced, trained and experienced personnel can be replaced only after months and months of training—that a human life itself can never be replaced.

**Taught Water Tricks.** This self-preservation course, taught by the experience method, includes training in how to extricate one's self from parachute harness after landing in water; how to inflate, rig and harness a rubber life raft; how to right an overturned raft and how to get in and out of the raft and to use other equipment provided. They are taught how to swim through debris, oil and fire, how to use shirts, trousers, duffel bag, mattress covers, etc., like a flotation gear, and life saving and artificial respiration.

They are impressed with the importance of helping the other fellow in the water by being constantly reminded that they might some time be the other fellow.

The use of oxygen in high-altitude flying and the recognition of the early symptoms of the lack of oxygen is trained in them by inclosure in compression chambers where the temperature and altitude can be varied in seconds.

But all the while they are kept in flying mood. From dawn until nearly midnight planes are taking off and coming down, every day in the week. They work and train seven days, including Sundays, but they get one day of recreation on each eighth day of the course. Six thousand flights a day are made from the air station and the drone of plane motors never ceases except between midnight and dawn. They get bombing, strafing practice and anti-submarine patrolling and bombing over the bays and the Gulf of Mexico.

**Eager to Meet Enemy.** Thousands of them are here and the personnel is constantly changing as each new group of youth come in, eager for those coveted wings and chance to get at the enemy. Their average age is 20, and

even this may be lowered as the young high school graduates begin to come in from the pre-flight schools under the Navy's new rules lowering the educational requirements.

In their flying practice the young future aviators are taught to take off in all kinds of country on the 40 air fields composing this station scattered over two counties of Florida and one in Alabama. Obstacles of all kinds are placed to teach the youngsters how to get their planes down safely and then up again, and they must even know how to repair them, because many times they

might be down in the jungle country of the South Pacific alone.

They get such a wide experience in all types of flying under all kinds of conditions that they are trained to meet any condition that might confront them in aerial combat, and are then ready for the polishing-off course at Jacksonville before being sent to the widespread battle areas of aerial conflict.

**Scrolls Given Doolittle  
Put on Display Here**

Two Chinese scrolls presented to Maj. Gen. James Doolittle in memory of his bombing of Tokyo are on exhibit at the Smithsonian Institution, following the lifting of a secrecy ban imposed by the War Department.

The scrolls were taken to the Institution last May by a War Department official, who instructed every one to observe silence until further notice.

One of the scrolls is a brilliant red,

embroidered with an eagle perched on an evergreen tree. It was the gift of an unnamed Chinese province passed through which Gen. Doolittle passed after the historic raid. The other is white, with an Oriental maple superimposed. They are inscribed with Chinese characters. The scrolls are to remain on exhibit indefinitely.



### Efforts Continued For Accord on Miners' Portal Pay Demand

**Lewis Is Reported Agreeable to Substance Of WLB Decision**

By the Associated Press.

The United Mine Workers and the soft coal operators meet again today to work out a solution of the miners' portal-to-portal pay demand, the only substantial issue unsettled by a War Labor Board ruling in the wage dispute.

UMW President John L. Lewis ordered the union's full policy committee to be here Saturday, presumably to ratify an agreement, but the conferees were not yet down to brass tacks.

Mr. Lewis, though still not formally recognizing the authority of

the WLB, is understood to have told the closed conference briefly that the miners accepted the substance of the board's decision and were ready to bargain for a portal-to-portal rate based on 90 minutes a day travel time.

UMW leaders spoke confidently of reaching an agreement that would give the miners an increase well above \$1 a day, including the increased vacation pay and free equipment and tools ordered by the WLB.

Internal problems apparently beset the operators. The meetings with the miners yesterday aggregated less than a half hour. Rescissions were taken twice at the operators' request. It is understood they were seeking a common basis on which a subcommittee could bargain for the whole group.

The truce under which the industry has been operating expires next Monday, but informed UMW sources said that if an agreement is not reached by then, the truce undoubtedly will be extended as long as bargaining continues.

'Prelude to War' Draws A Gala Premiere Audience

Capra Picture, Retracing the Steps Of Previous Films, Does It With a Marked Cleverness

By JAY CARMODY.

Once you get past the initial feeling that people must be taking turns making THIS picture, "Prelude to War," which opened so gallantly last night at Loew's Columbia begins to grip you. More than it teaches you what the war is all about—as if you had not been told—it impresses you with the fact that Lt. Col. Capra is an extraordinarily clever maker of movies. Saying nothing that has not been said before, and said with such calmly realized emphasis in "The World at War" a semester ago, "Prelude to War" neatly parries the danger of mere repetition and becomes a fine exhibition of Lt. Col. Capra's skill as a celluloid pulpiteer. Last night's be-starred, rib-ribbed and gold-braided premiere audience, which already knew what the war was about, paid the Signal Corps' outstanding movie-maker the deserved compliment of applause that sounded as sincere as it was loud and long.

"Prelude to War," which opens nationally today, is the Army's own version of the events leading up to today's tragedy. Aimed straight for the emotions, and employing all the tricks of eye and ear-appeal of which Lt. Col. Capra is the past-master, it was designed originally for service orientation purposes. Its success in that objective was such that its sponsors thought it should be sent in quest of a larger audience, the one on the home front. Its opening at the Columbia last night is the first step in that direction, and its reception by civilian audiences generally will determine whether other orientation movies will be similarly released. There are six others in the series.

As did its predecessors, "Prelude to War" looks back upon the years of uneasy peace with a dramatic eye of where they inevitably have led. It examines Germany and Japan and their decade of monster-making, and it glances with equal honesty at the lassitude and indifference and self-deception of the democracies. It tells a story which, if general audiences are not weary of hearing it, Lt. Col. Capra has handled with such remarkable skill that "Prelude to War" is a prelude to the general release of the other six pictures in the OWI's vaults.

As a piece of screencraft alone, it is something to behold. If two of a kind establish a trend in the affairs of Hollywood—and they do whenever columnists are hard up for an idea—the trend of today is to pay \$300,000 for successful dramas purchased by the cinema. That was the price which 20th Century-Fox paid for John Steinbeck's "The Moon Is Down," even though as a play it was well removed from the hit class. It also was the price for Maxwell Anderson's "The Eve of St. Mark." And, by way of confirming the trend, it is identical with the amount which Warner Bros. just paid to Joseph Fields for his "The Doughgirls."

The Fields comedy, which returns to the National for a fortnight starting next Monday, will be a long time reaching movie audiences, however. The contract specifies that it shall not be released in the celluloid version until it has run its career on the stage. That will be a year, maybe longer.

Stage Door Canteen notes: Come Friday night, the SDC will become the proud possessor of one of those diminutive pianos which miscellaneous troubadours may play, and to which other guests may sing, without having to climb on the stage. 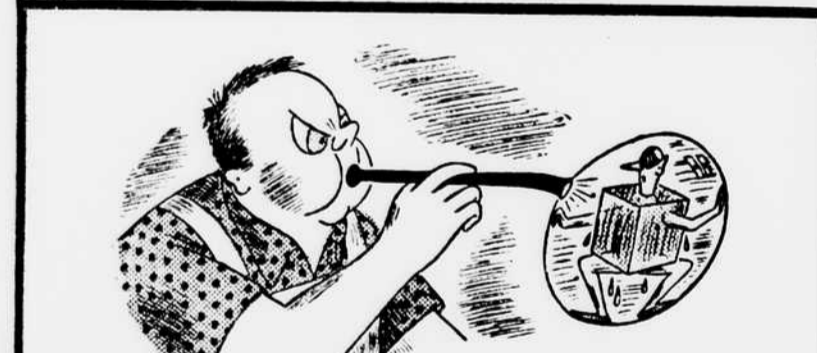

### Career's Climax Came at Height of a Raid

#### And Miss Everest Now Loves Best The Nazi Bombs

HOLLYWOOD. Picking the high spot of Barbara Everest's career is a task comparable with that performed by that distinguished ancestor of hers who surveyed the Himalayas, measured the tallest mountain in the world and for whom Mount Everest is named.

There was, of course, the school performance at which she was discovered. Also, her first professional engagement, which was in that classification of the English show world aptly known as the "fit ups." Also, her London debut as a juvenile lead in 1912. Also, her first Shakespearean lead, in the role of Portia in "The Merchant of Venice." And her bow before the movie cameras in 1917.

Miss Everest, currently engaged at Warner Bros. in the impersonation of Madame Litvinoff, wife of the Soviet Ambassador to the United States, in the film version of "The Merchant of Venice" all these, weighed them, dismissed them. Most vivid of her memories, she decided, dates back only two years to the reign of horror that was the battle Britain.

Nazi bombers were over London, then, every night, to drop their tons of death and destruction. Between the acts of this carnival of carnage, Londoners jammed their way into the theaters just the same. It devolved upon the players to issue the air-raid warnings from the stage, breaking off in the middle of a line of dialogue, often, to announce that the bombers were approaching. Similarly, they announced the end of a raid, with the stereotyped phrase "All is now clear."

Miss Everest was appearing then in a Shakespearean drama, in which a "funkey" brings in a letter. The script called for her to rip open the envelope, glance hastily at the letter and remark, "All is now clear," whereafter she read the missive.

On the particular occasion she recalls, the action got as far as her announcement, "All is now clear." At just that moment a signal from the wings interrupted her. Her next line to the audience was this: "I must inform you that an alert has been sounded."

It got the biggest laugh of her career. The incongruous juxtaposition of the two phrases convulsed the audience. It was five minutes before Miss Everest could return to the reading of the letter. And not one person in the audience left.

"Nobody ever moved, as a matter of fact," recalls Miss Everest. "But they always laughed when we announced that Hitler's bombers were on the way."

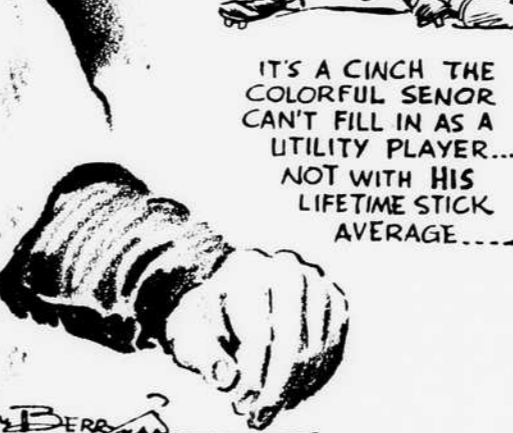

Yangtze River Opened As Far as Ichang in New Japanese Drive

Strong Infantry, Tank and Air Forces Mowed There, Chinese Say

CHUNGKING, May 27.—The Japanese have concentrated formidable infantry, tank and air forces along the Upper Yangtze for operations already well under way and apparently pointed at Chungking and have opened the great river itself as a supply route as far as Ichang, a Chinese military spokesman said today.

Ichang, 1,000 miles from the Yangtze's mouth and 462 miles below Chungking as the river winds, is the main base for vigorous drives into Western Hubei Province which have until now been confined to the river banks. The decision to work again was reached at a membership meeting and production was resumed on the 10 p.m. shift.

Artillery Moved Up River. The spokesman said, however, that recently Japanese gunboats and launches wormed their way along the swift, mine-infested waters of the river to Ichang and brought up tanks, jeeps and other small craft, some of them carrying artillery for the land forces.

He added that Japanese control of the river between Ichang and Shashi, 300 miles downstream, still was contested by Chinese units along the shore. However, a Japanese flagship has arrived at Shashi.

Land and Naval Advance Seen. The Chinese consider that the Japanese are trying to smash Chinese defenses on the river by launching a simultaneous land and naval advance on Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's provisional capital, the army spokesman stated.

Along the river below Ichang the Japanese have been using 10,000 and 40,000 reinforcements, massed on Hankow and Yochow, including a division just arrived at Hankow. They also have more than 200 planes between Hankow and Ichang and hundreds of tanks have reached Yochow, he said.

### West Coast Child Care Leader Arrives to Get Action on Funds

Mrs. Jack Moss Says War Production as Well As Children Affected

By SUSAN B. ANTHONY II.  
Lack of child care centers in the war-busy cities of the West Coast has brought Mrs. Jack Moss 3,000 miles across the country to get action.

"Since I couldn't find out anything back home, or get enough child care centers by long distance, I came to the source of funds and information—Washington," said Mrs. Moss, who is chairman of the OCD Child Care Committee in San Francisco Valley, Calif. She arrived yesterday.

"Children of women working at Lockheed, Vega, Bendix, Timms and other giant aircraft plants in my State are being left in parking lots because there is no place else to leave them. There are totally inadequate nursery schools or school-age programs for the 6-to-16-year-olds."

**Affects War Production.**  
Turnover, absence and resignations of working mothers increase daily because of lack of child care facilities, she said.

"Yet, California employers so desperately need women workers that they are recruiting them by calling every number in the telephone book which looks as though there might be a potential woman worker at the other end of the line."

The Los Angeles situation, according to Mrs. Moss and New York Child Care Leader Mrs. Kathryn Hill, who came to Washington with her, is a localized aspect of the problem that "threatens the entire war production program."

Mrs. Moss and Mrs. Hill, who is executive secretary of the New York Committee for the Care of Children in Wartime, today are calling on Federal child care officials to find out why there is so little information in the States as to how and where to apply for Federal child care funds.

**Other Questions to Settle.**  
"We are also going to find out why there is as yet no bill in Congress

that will speed up the present slow process of getting Federal funds for nursery schools," said Mrs. Hill. "We are going to find out why there is no plan even to give one Federal agency full operating power to grant funds to war cities and towns."

A child care bill now is pending before the Senate Education and Labor Committee, S. 1130, sponsored by Charles Taft's Community War Services Agency. According to child care leaders, however, it slows up even further the process of getting funds. It prevents communities from obtaining any money for nursery schools and school-age centers until the entire State has obtained approval of an overall child care plan from Mr. Taft, the Office of Education or the United States Children's Bureau.

Only a strong operating Federal program can begin to provide the necessary thousands of nurseries and school-age centers needed for the millions of children of war-

client child care funds," declared Mrs. Moss.

"The behavior of New York State in cutting down a sum of \$10,000,000 to \$2,500,000 for child care programs is another instance," Mrs. Hill added.

"In less than a month millions of the Nation's youngsters will be let out of school to roam the streets during the summer vacation," said Mrs. Hill.

"Yet there is no money now or any prospect of funds that we in the States can get to provide supervised summer programs for these youngsters on an adequate scale," declared Mrs. Moss.

"Even if the inadequate sum sug-

gested by Charles Taft's agency is appropriated, no funds for summer programs will be available in any State until school opens again next fall," said the New York leader.

## Victory Gardens

### FLEA BEETLE

By WILBUR H. YOUNGMAN, The Star's Garden Editor.

Many gardeners have reported that the flea beetle is doing considerable injury. This small very active and hungry pest is commonly prevalent in most gardens, although seldom having quite such a good time as this year. They get their name from their power to jump about so quickly that they are seldom seen. The small black beetles are hardly more than a sixteenth of an inch long.

Commonly they attack radishes, tomatoes and potatoes, but this year they are doing better and seem to be working on other vegetable crops. Beans, cucumbers, squash and beets have been reported to be on their diet this year.

The usual evidence of their work is a number of small round holes chewed through the leaves. While these holes seldom prove fatal to a plant they do seriously reduce the functioning of the leaves, consequently the plant's vigor. We usually sow the seed of cucumbers and squash thickly because of this pest.

The flea beetle is not hard to control, and because of its widespread occurrence we find many home remedies listed. One gardener suggested using common flour. The beetle would feed on the flour and thus leave the plant leaves alone. Another remedy is to sprinkle the foliage with wood ashes, while others use hydrated lime. A Bordeaux spray is an excellent repellent, and when lead arsenate is added, many of the beetles will be poisoned. Cryolite is effective, as is rotenone, but the latter stomach poison should be reserved for use on beans and edible leafy vegetables such as cabbage and chard.

There are usually three generations of the flea beetle a year, although the early spring generation is the most destructive, as it destroys leaf surface while the plants are small and should be making rapid growth. The later generations seem to do relatively little serious damage to the garden crops, but this may be due to their feeding on weeds.

The flea beetle hibernates during the winter among the weeds and under leaves and other rubbish. The collecting of such material and putting it into the compost pile, together with lime and other materials that expedite rotting, will do much to reduce the numbers of this pest. Let's start our insect control program early for the next season by carefully cleaning the premises of all hiding places of insects this fall.



#### Queen Visits Juliana; Minister to Come Here

OTTAWA, May 27.—Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands arrived here yesterday by air from England for a brief, unofficial visit with Crown Princess Juliana and her three princesses, the youngest of whom is to be christened June 29.

The Queen was accompanied on her trip, via Montreal, by Netherlands Foreign Minister E. N. van Kleffens, who also is expected to visit Washington, and her principal secretary, George van Goudriaan van Tets, and two members of her personal staff.

They were met at the airport by Princess Juliana and the Princesses Beatrix and Irene and a group of Canadian officials headed up by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King.

The Queen proceeded immediately to the home of Juliana for her first look at the youngest Dutch Princess, Margriet Franciska.

It was the Queen's third trans-Atlantic flight and it was believed that she would remain here until after the christening of the Princess at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Ottawa. The christening will be performed by Dr. Winifred Burggraf, pastor of the Reformed Church of Huguenot Park and Princes Bay, Staten Island, N. Y.

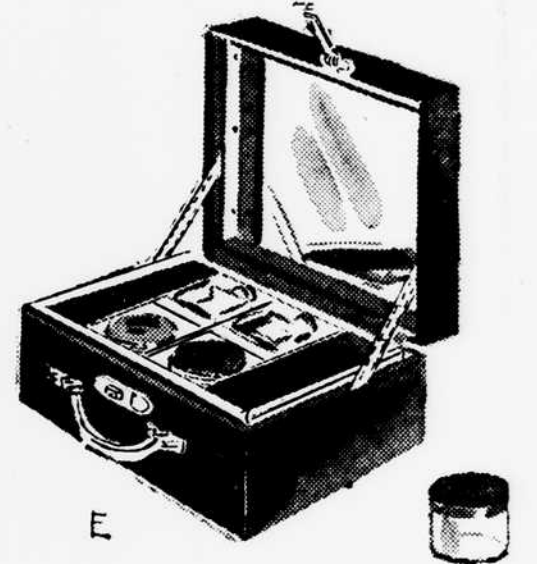

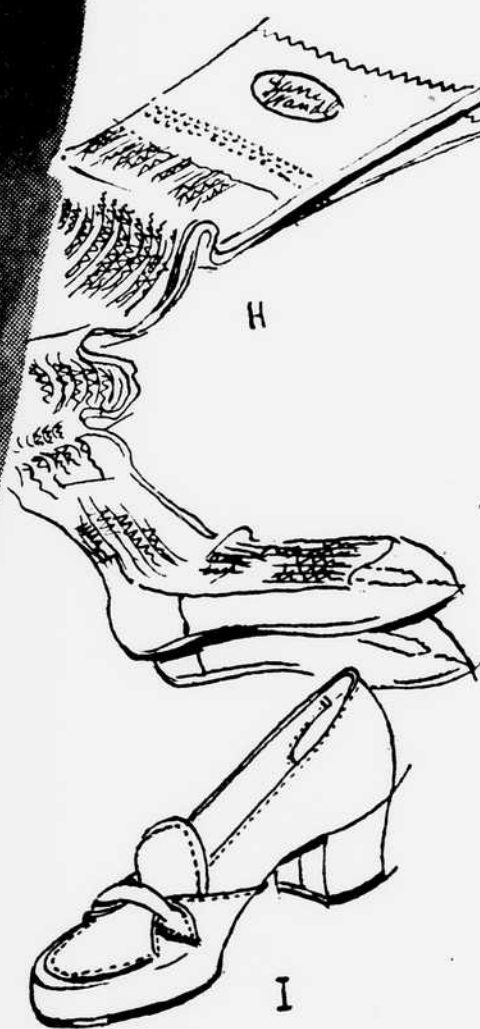

As color, however, it is as authentic as it is tragic and understandable. The girls had been criminally deprived of a saxophone, alto, a saxophone, tenor, and two trumpets. And the atrocity occurred the night, or early morning, before the opening of their engagement across the street.

The hysteria, which Artistic Director-Chaperone-General Manager Hill at length managed to quell, stemmed from more than the initial circumstance of the theft itself. For half a tortured day, efforts of the troupe to beg, borrow or buy replacements met with dismal failure. With each successive telephone inquiry to music shops in town, the tears and enshining of teeth mounted. By twilight, the Victory Room had acquired that oppressive atmosphere usually associated with the torture chambers of Torquemada. But the stout-hearted leadership and persistence of Mrs. Hill finally prevailed; emotions subsided, and substitute instruments uncovered in time for the evening performance.

Nonetheless, a feeling of tension and restiveness hangs heavy in the Victory Room. The girls are playing on borrowed time. Their stay in Washington ends next Tuesday, which leaves little time to press the pursuit of the perpetrators. Having dismissed the possibility of rival orchestras being behind the crime (after all, it was four instruments not instrumentalists, that were taken), the girls are at a complete loss.

Only one chance remains, and it is up to every conscientious patron to do his bit by keeping on the alert. Be inquisitive of any new quartet comprised of two saxophones and two trumpets, forwarding any well-grounded suspicions to Mrs. Hill, care of Betty McGuire and her Sub Debs, the address for whom will probably be Central Park or Lafayette Park unless the missing norms are turned up right quick.

Like a bundle of laundry deposited in the chute, the denouement of the mystery event in the Northeast lands in the laps of patrons before they have had a chance to ponder what might be in it. CIO Official Sees Chance for Profits In Postwar America

'Normalcy' Won't Solve Problems, Industrial Conference Board Told

By the Associated Press. NEW YORK, May 27.—James B. Carey, secretary-treasurer of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, said last night the postwar United States ought to offer "an opportunity for the businessman to make profits and for every individual to use his abilities to the utmost to make a decent living and enjoy the intellectual and cultural fruits of civilization."

Speaking before 2,000 key executives at the 27th annual meeting of the National Industrial Conference Board, business research organization, Mr. Carey declared a return to "normalcy" will not solve the country's postwar problems. "The failure to accept the necessity for a new approach (to economic and social problems) gave Hitler his chance" after the last war, and failure to meet the test of new thinking now will mean "other systems, not based on democracy, will triumph in many portions of the world and perhaps here, too," Mr. Carey said.

Collaboration Urged. He proposed immediate collaboration on important problems affecting labor, management and government. Paul G. Hoffman, president of the Studebaker Corp. and chairman of the Committee for Economic Development, a business group engaged in postwar studies, said failure to attain peacetime production and employment levels which would have "seemed fantastic three years ago" would endanger our free society.

Mr. Hoffman said a group of economists and experts was working for the CED on recommendations for changes in the policies of Government, labor and business which would promote a favorable postwar "climate," but would publish its conclusions independently, "without revision or censorship from the businessmen."

Dr. Compton Speaks. While the average American's first desire after the war probably will be to get a thick slice of the second pie, Dr. Compton said, he would like to get a good house to cook it in. Dr. Wilson Compton, secretary of the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association, believes.

Dr. Compton predicted that new homes might be built at the rate of 1,000,000 family units a year for 10 years as a result of postwar conditions. This compares with an average of 712,000 a year in the 1920s and as few as 54,000 in the depression year of 1933.

"The increased demand for new housing may well be greater than any one has estimated," Dr. Compton said.

The postwar house will not be revolutionary in design, Dr. Compton predicted, but will be compact and more convenient than present homes.

# Report to the Housewife

Fresh Fruits and Vegetables Plentiful This Week; All Meats Except Pork Very Scarce in Markets

If you must have your fresh meat this week end, better turn to pork, regardless of warm weather. Rumor has it that recent Government buying has been concentrated on beef, veal and lamb—so pork is about the only fresh meat that is available to Washington housewives at the moment. Kidneys, liver and other meat sundries have put on a disappearing act in many markets, too, which makes the menu problem more difficult than ever. However, there will be a good supply of smoked meats, such as strip bacon, butts, hams and so on, if you have points enough to buy them.

The poultry situation shows no improvement—in fact, many dealers predict that there will be fewer chickens than ever in town over the week end. Some markets will have a few fryers and roasters for regular customers, but in general the picture is rather grim. Once again, don't overlook the quick-frozen poultry now available in many stores. It solves your problem in the best possible way.

Fish from nearby waters and from the South is plentiful, but due to labor troubles in New England, supplies from there have been very limited. Flounder and perch are practically unobtainable here, although there is cod to be had. Shad, rock and herring are on the way out for this year, but you can get plenty of butterfish, croakers, porgies, sea bass, trout, haddock and Boston mackerel. There's good crab meat, delicious soft-shell crabs and cooked and raw shrimp available, but little or no lobster.

The news of the proposed rationing of soft or perishable cheeses has been a blow to many of us who have been finding the answer to meatless meals in the good old-time menu of

### SODA BISCUITS.

In the Evening Star of May 24 in the Readers' Clearing House there was a request for a soda biscuit recipe. It so happens that I have a really old recipe for this biscuit and am enclosing it herewith. Hope Mrs. A. C. of Washington who requested such a recipe will enjoy this:

- 2 cups flour.
- 2 teaspoons of shortening. Let stand until lukewarm.
- 1 cup milk (about).
- 2 cups yeast.
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar.
- 1/2 teaspoon salt.
- 1/2 cup lard.
- 1 cup milk (about).
- 2 cups yeast.

### BREAD RECIPE.

In reply to the request of Mrs. J. O. M., for a bread recipe using compressed yeast, I would like to submit the following:

- 1 cake compressed yeast.
- 2 quarts water (or water and milk).
- 2 tablespoons sugar.
- 2 tablespoons lard, melted.
- 6 quarts sifted flour.
- 2 tablespoons salt.

cover. Set overnight to rise, for about 9 hours. In the morning, mold into loaves. Fill well-greased pans half full. Cover and let rise till light or until loaves have doubled in bulk. Bake 40 to 45 minutes. This makes six large loaves. I have found this recipe excellent.

### TWO REQUESTS ANSWERED.

In response to Mrs. J. O. N.'s request for a bread recipe the following is the best I have ever used and never fails if followed carefully: Put into a large mixing bowl 1 1/2 cups of scalded milk, 2 tablespoons of sugar, 2 teaspoons of salt and 3 tablespoons of shortening. Let stand until lukewarm.

Disolve two cakes of compressed yeast in one-half cup of lukewarm water and add to milk mixture. Add one well-beaten egg. Add five cups of sifted flour, gradually. Knead lightly until dough can be lifted from bowl. Place in greased bowl, grease dough, cover with a towel and cover and set in a warm spot to rise.

When dough has risen to twice its original bulk knead lightly on lightly floured board and then make into four dozen small rolls (a little larger than a walnut) or into three loaves. Have pans well greased and brush sides and tops of rolls with melted shortening. Cover with towel and let rise to about twice their size again. Bake in 450-degree oven for 12 or 15 minutes. The whole process takes only about two hours.

### MACARONI PICNIC SALAD.

- 2 cups cooked macaroni
- 1 cup diced celery
- 4 tablespoons chopped green pepper
- 2 tablespoons pimento
- 2 tablespoons chopped sweet pickle
- Salt
- Tabasco sauce
- Mayonnaise
- 1 hard-boiled egg

Combine the first six ingredients, tossing lightly. Season with salt and a few drops of Tabasco sauce. Add enough mayonnaise to moisten, and garnish with slices of hard-cooked egg.

# Canning Fruits

Latest Word on Approved Methods; Stamps Make Extra Sugar Available

By Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, Agricultural Research Administration.

Homemakers who felt like rookies last year, putting up fruit on war rations of sugar, will swing into fruit canning this second war summer with the assurance of veterans. And using hands at home canning will have an easier time, for they may copy.

The methods that worked best in canning fruit last year will suit 1943 sugar rations, say home economists of the United States Department of Agriculture.

The starting point for a homemaker's planning is to get this year's sugar facts well in mind. A home canner may get up to 10 pounds of sugar for each person in her family by using stamps Nos. 15 and 16 in War Ration Book 1 designated for that purpose. If she needs more sugar than she may apply to her local war price and ration board and get coupons which will allow her to buy up to 15 pounds per person in addition to the original allotment. The guiding rule for using the sugar stamps is to allow 1 year: Allow 1 quart of sugar to each 4 quarts of finished fruit. If desired, 5 pounds of sugar per person may be requested for making preserves or jellies or fruit butters, but this must be included within the 25 pounds of "canning sugar" allowed to one person.

liquid to each quart jar of fruit to fill in around the solid food and to cover it well.

The home canning sugar ration allows about 1/2 cup of sugar to use in each quart jar, as an average.

Here are pointers from the home economists for canning the berries, cherries and other summer fruits as they come along, so that the fruits, the sugar ration and the home canner herself may all keep in step.

1. Shift the sugar to fit the fruit. Sour fruits may demand—and get—more than the average. In that case, you will count on giving short-rations of sugar to some of your very juicy and sweet fruits. Often you can taste the natural flavor of sweet fruit better when less sugar is used.

2. Put up some fruit without sugar, if necessary. It's true that a little sugar helps canned fruits to hold color and flavor. But the sugar isn't essential to keep the canned fruit from spoiling. Fruit for pie making is often canned without sugar, by choice. So is fruit for diabetic diets. So, if you have good good fruit than sugar at any time this summer, don't let it go to waste. Can the fruit and mark the jars plainly to indicate "no sugar." Then you can plan to serve and sweeten the fruit to taste when the family can best spare sugar from its weekly ration.

3. Precook fruit in fruit juice, or sirup, or water. Adding sugar before heating the fruit will help draw out juice. Some fruits thus treated yield enough juice of their own so that no additional liquid is needed. There is good reason for the fruit before it goes into the canner. Precooking shrinks the fruit, helping you to get more into each jar—which is good wartime economy of glass jars and metal caps, and economy of shelf space in pantries. However—never cram the bottom down tight, of course. Allow a good proportion of liquid to each jar.

4. Thin or moderately thin sirup is in step with the sugar ration. For thin sirup, use 1 cup of sugar to 3 cups of water. For moderately thin sirup, use 1 cup of sugar to 2 cups of water or juice. If sour cherries or other really sour fruits require a medium-thick sirup, use 1 cup of sugar to 1 1/2 cups of water or juice.

5. The extract you use: Fruit and heat some of your softer juice fruits to boiling. Use very hot water, or set the pan over hot water, so the fruit won't stick to the pan. Be sure the fruit used for juice is as perfect as any fruit you put up. Cut out any trace of bruise or decay, for the canning fruits holds good: "A bit of decay may spoil a batch." When the juice flows freely, strain it. Squeeze to taste, if desired.

6. In place of sugar, use if you wish some of a mild-flavored sirup like honey or corn syrup. Use honey to replace up to half of your sugar, or corn sirup to replace up to one-third of your sugar. A larger proportion of the sirup would mask the delicate fruit flavor.

7. Three don'ts to end with: Don't use in your canning any sirups that have high flavor of their own, such as maple, sorghum or molasses. Don't use brown sugar. Don't use saccharine in canning; if you wish to use saccharine to sweeten canned fruit, add it just before serving, or the fruit may take on a bitter taste.

# Fountain Finds

Take a Few Hints From the Impresarios Behind the Drugstore Lunch Counter

By the Victory Chef

A family dinner is a far cry from the rush and go of the modern soda fountain operating as a lunchroom and restaurant, but some of the things which the impresarios of the fountainette can do are worth watching—and, what is more, worth copying for home use!

Armed with a trusty folder of points, we pick up what the market affords—a little of this and a little of that. And with it we go home and make "triple deekers"—hot and spicy and covered with good gravy or pickle relish or tomato sauce. Or we toss together a little stew pan of barbecue sauce for the finishing touch.

For luncheon or dinner our menu is a huge hot sandwich, a side dish of cole slaw and a salad of mixed oranges, apples and (maybe) a banana as dessert. With a cup of coffee or tea—or iced in a glass—there's a meal.

One day recently we expended our points on a one-pound piece of round steak. This we divided equally into six portions. Then we pounded each portion into shape for a hot sandwich. As we pounded, we worked in all the flour the meat would hold. And these bits we broiled. They didn't look very big and man-sized as they rested on

their platter, but when laid on a large slice of bread, topped with another slice of bread and then a spreading of pickle relish and then another slice of bread, and then the whole covered with a serving of gravy we made out of the drippings—well, there was a meal in itself!

We also owned a small can of string beans and these we mixed with some chopped cooked beets, added a bit of minced onion, pepper and salt and some mayonnaise—and you just can't beat that for a salad to go with a hot broiled beef sandwich.

Another time, we can do this with two slices of toast. For each sandwich allow one egg, a tablespoonful of minced ham or bacon, a little minced onion and a little minced green pepper. Cook individual round patties of this mixture, like a flat omelette, and then lay it between the toast. Serve a dish of plain lettuce and french dressing with this, or sliced tomatoes or maybe your Victory garden will come forth with a meal and there's a dinner of no mean proportions.

We were speaking of barbecue sauce—if there is any meat left over—cold roast or cold boiled meat of any kind—slice it into thin slivers, brown in a little fat, dress it up with a bit of barbecue sauce—add a slice of raw onion and a leaf of lettuce—and what a sandwich!

You'd better figure on encores if you make these tidbits. The barbecue sauce is something that is sort of "played by ear," as it were. Into a little saucepan put a spoonful of fat (bacon drippings do very well) then a chopped onion and a few tablespoonsful of broth and use a bouillon cube to make it up if you have no left over broth or brown gravy). Then add a tablespoon or two of vinegar and then the hot ingredients—some cayenne or black pepper and a dash of tobacco sauce and a little Worcestershire sauce and some ground chili pepper. Cook this all together for five or ten minutes. Strain it or not, just as you like. Then either dip the bits of fried meat in the sauce before making the sandwich or sprinkle a little on the meat after it is on the bread.

Use round hamburger rolls or toast or plain bread. Of, if you have finger rolls (that is, hot dog rolls) slit off the tops, scoop out the centers, make small canoes. Fill the canoes with hash or bits of meat and potatoes and any left over vegetable, top off with a little left over gravy or bits of butter, place under the broiler until the top is browned.

1 4-ounce can sliced or button mushrooms (3 points),  
Cottage cheese,  
Mayonnaise.  
Remove tops from tomatoes. Scoop out about half the pulp; mix with cottage cheese, blended with mayonnaise. Blend in mushrooms (drained from juice or fat). # Picnic—1943

With Pleasure Driving Banned, Foods Must Be Easy to Pack and Carry

Decorating Day comes this year, as all holidays should, on a weak end. Many of us, however, will be taking no holiday as factory machinery and office typewriters in war industries must not stop. Perhaps the picnic season which this date marks will be opened on Sunday instead of on Monday when it would usually be celebrated. Parks and nearby country will be full of picnickers if the weather is favorable. Some of the groups will have lunch boxes with them, while others will plan a cooked meal where facilities are available.

Most picnickers this year will travel light, as transportation will have to be by street car or foot. Paper cups and plates, as well as napkins are in order, whether we plan to cook over a grill or to eat from a lunch box. Paper spoons and forks can also be used unless you have saved your points and can buy a steak or a slice of ham for grill. Even these may be cut into pieces before or after broiling and served between slices of bread, sandwich style.

If steak, hamburger or frankfurters are chosen, it is a good idea to slice a few onions at home and to wrap them in wax paper to be cooked with the meat to add a bit of flavor. With frankfurters you will probably prefer buns to bread for the "blanket." Even salad may be served in paper cups if thick dressing is used. You will probably be content with radishes and scallions which are so good just now and do without salad

### Economy Croquettes

Food sharing doesn't need to be a burden to the wise homemaker. Meals can be planned and served combining the less abundant meats, fruits and vegetables, with foods which are more plentiful.  
½ pound ground beef,  
1 cup grated carrots,  
1 cup fine moist bread crumbs,  
¼ cup grated onion,  
1 egg,  
1 teaspoon salt,  
¼ teaspoon pepper.  
Cracker crumbs.  
Lard for deep fat frying.  
Combine all ingredients, except cracker crumbs. Shape into croquettes. Roll in cracker crumbs. Cook until brown in deep hot lard at 360 degrees F. Drain on absorbent paper. Serves six.

# All Honey Cake Saves Sugar

Your family craves cake—but your sugar supply is low? All right! Here is a recipe for dad's favorite chocolate luncheon cake, that may be prepared without a particle of sugar—and only two eggs.

**ALL HONEY CHOCOLATE CAKE.**  
2 cups sifted cake flour; 1 ½ teaspoons soda; 1 teaspoon salt; ½ cup butter or other shortening; 1 ½ cups honey; 2 eggs unbeaten; 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted; ¾ cup water; 1 teaspoon vanilla.  
Sift flour once, measure, add soda and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter, add honey gradually beating well after each addition. Add ½ of flour and beat until smooth and well blended. Add eggs one at a time beating well after each. Add chocolate and blend. Add remaining flour in thirds, alternate with water in halves, beating very well after each addition. Add vanilla. Bake in two greased 9-inch layer pans in moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) 30 minutes, or until done. Spread your favorite frosting between layers and on top of cake.

Note—For best results, beat very well at each stage of mixing.

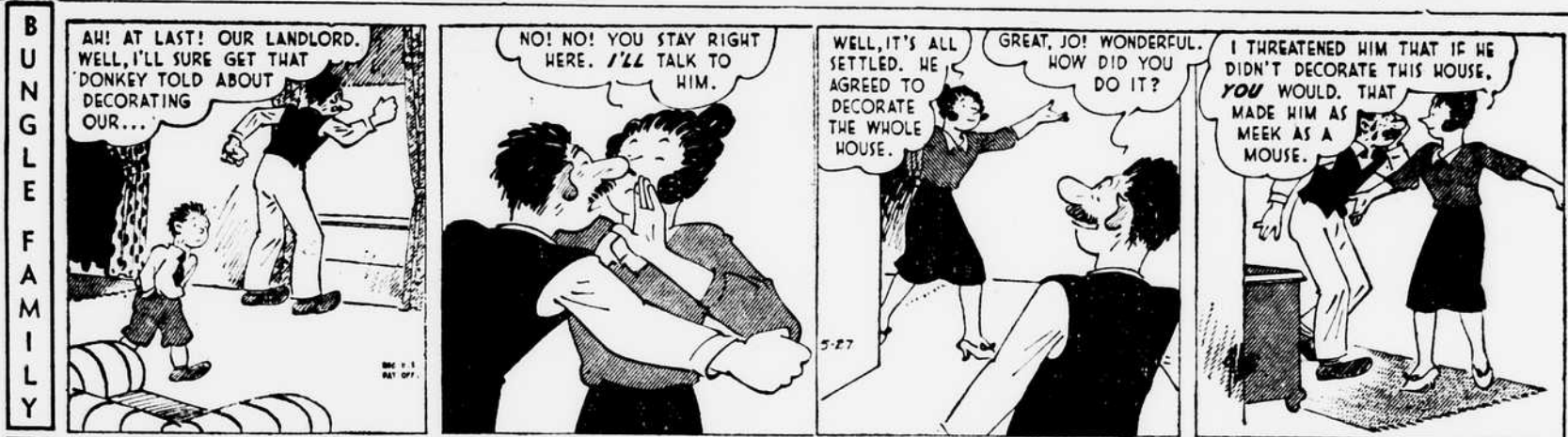

**Nature's Children**

**MORNING GLORY**  
(Convolvulus major)

South America is the true home of our common morning glory. This wildling now may be found growing over the Eastern United States and Canada, where it has escaped from the narrow confines of a garden to roam the fields, meadows, fence rails and such places. Today there are so many exquisite descendants of the first cultivated morning glories that one hardly

not wonder so much at the beauties of today.

Of course, the morning glory is most abundant in the tropics. Ours are mere herbs in comparison. Usually these flowers have trailing or twining stems, and how they do climb over everything if they get an opportunity to do so.

The leaves are alternate. The flowers are perfect, with five sepals; the corolla, with united petals of more or less a funnel form and usually five-lobed. In the bud, they are folded and twisted lengthwise. The seed box or fruit is a capsule, with from one to four large seeds. The wild morning glories resist themselves, and the birds also assist in their distribution.

In many places, the morning glory is considered a troublesome weed. The field morning glory, introduced from Europe, has very deep roots and attractive flowers. But the leaves are dull green and look rather rough, smooth, to the touch, they are quite smooth. The white flowers are about 1 inch wide, striped with pink and tinged with yellow at the base and pink on the outside, striped with a less brilliant, but deeper color. There is the yellow morning glory that has pretty foliage and many others.

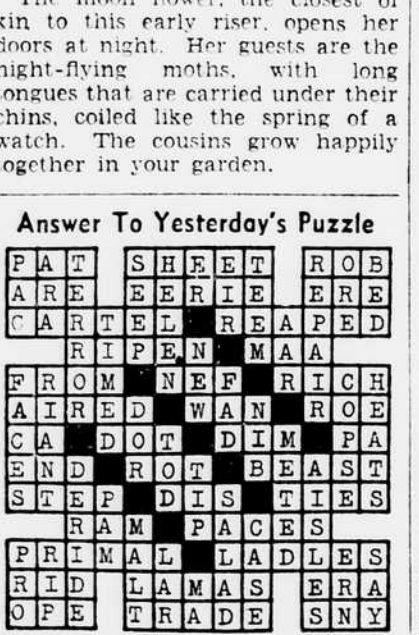
From early morning until the sun is quite high, these flowers open their portals to their guests. Nectar and pollen are served, and flowers assured for next season.

The moon flower, the closest of kin to this early riser, opens her doors at night. Her guests are the night-flying moths, with long tongues that are carried under their chins, coiled like the spring of a watch. The cousins grow happily together in your garden.

Morning glories naturally seem to seek unsightly places to make radiant with their presence. This year, many people are planning to cultivate the heavenly blue, red glory and radiant white in combination. There is only one drawback to these giant flowers, according to the remarks on the package in which they come. They must be replanted each year.

Darwin, who loved to experiment with the flowers, once decided to take six seeds fertilized with pollen taken from flowers on a different vine. These he planted in the same type of soil in which he also placed six self-fertilized seeds. The cross-fertilized seeds produced much larger flowers and sent up stems 2 feet higher.
