

Municipal Workers Threaten New Strike In Los Angeles

By the Associated Press. LOS ANGELES, Mar. 2.—Union officials declared last night that unless their wage increase demands are met by Sunday a new strike may engulf the municipal water and power system here, which only Tuesday was restored to corporate operation after the Army stepped in and halted a 10-day walkout.

In a telegram to Undersecretary of War Patterson, Ernest Taylor, business agent for the AFL International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, declared that unless a satisfactory settlement is announced to a union meeting scheduled for Sunday, "I predict an even more serious strike for Monday."

Copies were dispatched to Joseph Keenan of the War Production Board, Col. Rufus W. Putnam, Army Engineer chief here who was installed as head Government representative during the military operation, and Mayor Fletcher Bowron.

Col. Putnam could not be reached for comment, but A. van Norman, plant general manager, expressed belief the new strike threat was "pretty nasty action."

He said a new wage plan already was being formulated for study.

Approximately 2,500 plant employees walked out, beginning Feb. 14, demanding an 8 per cent wage increase or a flat \$15 monthly raise for all workers receiving less than \$350 a month.

When the Army stepped in, the strike, combined with a prolonged rainstorm, had interrupted service to nearly 200 war plants and more than 100,000 homes.

The Army's return of the plant to corporate operation Tuesday left the controversy unsettled.

Four Reported Killed In Midair Plane Crash

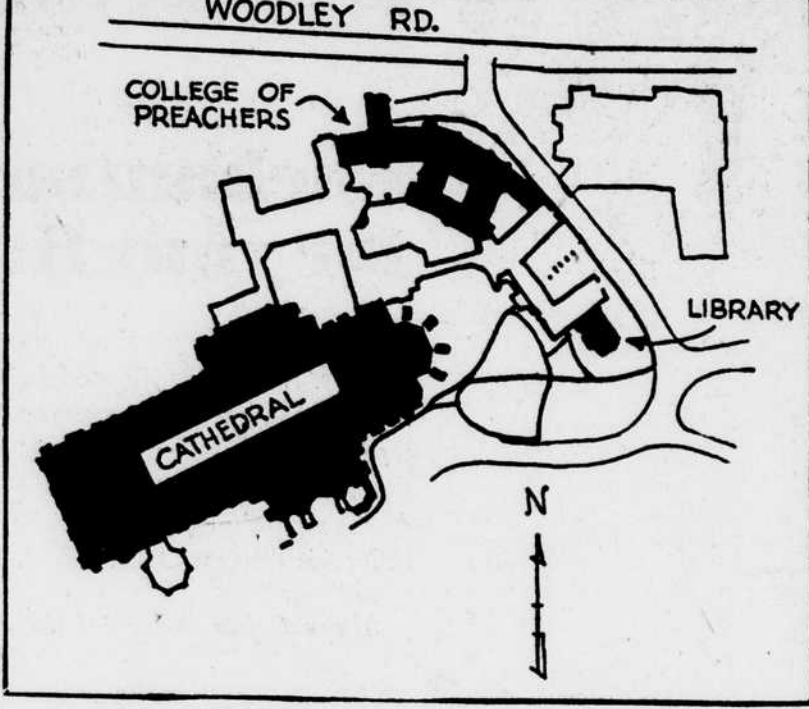

Farrell Still Faces Many Problems After Putting Down Revolt

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Mar. 2.—Acting President Edelmiro Farrell of Argentina turned his attention today to a host of domestic and international problems which apparently were only slightly eased by his victory yesterday in quelling a minor revolt.
While Gen. Farrell, abetted by Acting War Minister Col. Juan Peron and local troops, easily met the threat to his newly-delegated authority which was presented when Lt. Col. Tomas Duco attempted a coup to restore Gen. Pedro Ramirez to the presidency, he still is facing the fundamental decision of whether to head toward restoration of constitutional government or yield to the pressure of radical nationalists.
What action, if any, Farrell takes on such questions as the drastic press regulations now in force, recreation of political parties and calling elections may serve to indicate his future policies. He also must attempt a new foreign minister.
Britain to Back U. S. Policy.
Although Farrell's government has insisted it is only a continuation of the Ramirez regime, it is bound to take into account the skeptical attitude made evident in Washington and other American capitals.
Great Britain's assurance that it would concur in whatever policy Washington adopts could not help but give even the most extreme nationalist pause in view of Britain's

economic importance as Argentina's best customer.
Possibly weighting the scales in favor of a more liberal policy was the Argentine Navy's apparent decision to lend its support to the Farrell administration. The Navy, while generally aloof from politics in Argentina, is considered a moderating influence opposed to extremist trends.
Also the fact that Ramirez failed to exploit Duco's ill-fated action might be reckoned as a point in favor of stability existing in the present regime. On the other hand, Ramirez has held off on any statement supplementing his original delegation of executive power to Farrell.
Duco's Fate Unknown.
Duco's fate still was a subject for speculation today. Some rumors circulated that he had been executed. Another version was that he was lodged in the naval hospital. Meanwhile, a family quarrel with neighboring Uruguay arose last night over the manner in which Montevideo radios and newspapers treated news of the Duco attempts. Forced by the tight Argentine censorship to receive information through haphazard means, many Uruguayan news organs accepted exaggerated and distorted stories. The Argentine Ambassador, Carlos Quintana, expressed his government's displeasure and Uruguayan officials directed Montevideo radio to tone down their comments.
Information showed Toliver's driver's permit had been revoked because of his physical condition. Bulgaria and Hungary React Strongly to Finnish Peace Talks

LONDON, Mar. 2.—Strong reactions in both Bulgaria and Hungary to the Finnish-Russian peace negotiations were reported today in British press dispatches from the Middle East, and both Axis satellites were represented as possibly trying to get out of the war.
At the same time, Berlin broadcast a DNB Sofia dispatch saying Bulgarian Premier Dobri Bozilov would make an "important" radio speech Sunday to the Hungarian MTTI agency announced Premier Nicolai Kallay would discuss "matters of great importance" today in the Hungarian Parliament, and the Budapest radio was permitted to describe the Russian peace terms as "very lenient."
Dispatches from Ankara and Cairo saying both Bulgaria and Hungary might be seeking peace were treated with greatest reserve in London official circles, but considerable speculation was stirred over the arrival in Cairo of Sir Hugh Knatchbull-Hugessen, British Ambassador to Turkey, shortly after Bulgarian Minister Bababanoff returned to Turkey from conferences with his government.
The greatest fear in both Rumania and Hungary, and the principal spur to peace, it was emphasized in London, is the approach of the Russian armies to the borders of both countries, with the possibility that each might become a bloody battlefield.

Britain Reported Halting Shipments to Turkey
ANKARA, Mar. 2 (AP).—Reports were current here today that Britain has halted delivery of both military and civilian supplies to Turkey as a result of the recent collapse of British-Turkish military talks.
While there was no confirmation from Turkish officials, it was obvious that the British had stopped shipments, which were interpreted in some quarters as part of a campaign to high-pressure Turkey into entering the war on the side of the Allies.
It also was reported without confirmation that American lease-lend material was included in the stoppage. If the report concerning the British action is correct, however, this might be so, for most sea-borne shipments to Turkey arrive in British bottoms and the overland routes are under British control.
Some quarters held that if the British have stopped shipments of war material to Turkey it might mean that they have now written Turkey out of the picture as a possible military ally and that they are planning a campaign against Southeastern Europe as an alternative.

It seemed unlikely, at any rate, that Turkish policy could be influenced by the reported stoppage—if that were Britain's intent.
Taking cognizance of suggestions that this might be Britain's plan, one highly placed Turk said: "It looks as though they are trying to work on our nerves, but they must remember we are people with strong nerves."
Capt. R. W. Beers Listed as Missing
Capt. Robert W. Beers, 23, of 2500 Massachusetts avenue N.W. was listed by the War Department today as missing in action while participating in the bombing of Frankfurt on January 28.
A graduate of the West Point class of 1942, Capt. Beers received his preflight training at George Field, Ill. He has been overseas nearly a year.
In letters to his wife, Mrs. Sara M. Beers, he disclosed that he had participated in six raids over Germany, including the bombings of Berlin and Emden. Capt. Beers wrote in his last letter received here last month that he expected to receive the Air Medal.
A native of Pittsburgh, Capt. Beers met his wife, the former Sara Miller of this city, in Florida two years ago and they were married shortly afterward. They have a 10 months' old son, William, Jr.
Capt. Beers was pilot of the Flying Fortress which failed to return from the Frankfurt raid.

Japs Double Powers Of Home Front Police

Whiteside Proposes Postwar Control of Civilian Production

Russia's Terms to Finland

Moscow's official announcement regarding Finland is hopeful in two respects. In the first place, it is the first time that contact between the Russian and Finnish governments has been publicly acknowledged.

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Way to Philippines

Strategies of Navy and MacArthur Merge in Seizure of Admiralty Isles

By DAVID LAWRENCE.

The strategy of the Navy has met up with the strategy of Gen. MacArthur in the South Pacific and the seizure of the Admiralty Islands prepares the way for the ultimate recapture of the Philippines sometime in the year 1945.

The little islands, which have been taken by amphibious forces in the South Pacific contain airfields that dominate the approaches to the Netherlands East Indies as well as the Philippines.

Our naval and land forces now flank the Japanese on almost every sector of the ocean in the South Pacific. Every important channel between islands is dominated by our Navy. The truth is that the capture of the Admiralty Islands is in itself perhaps more important in the long run than the raids on Truk or the Marianas—important though these attacks are, of course, in the forcing of the Japanese fleet back to home waters.

For immediate purposes the conquest of the Solomons Islands, including Bougainville, under Admiral Halsey, and the relentless advance of our armed forces in New Guinea, under Gen. MacArthur, may have some far-reaching effects on Japanese strategy. The Japanese may have to make up their minds whether they will send a fleet to defend the bases on the western end of New Guinea or whether they will fight merely a delaying action.

Air Supremacy is Key.
Our air supremacy in the South Pacific, both from the decks of carriers and by land-based planes, has prevented the Japanese from sending surface vessels of any size to reinforce their garrisons and most of the latter are being left to starve. Our surface patrols have done effective work in sinking barges and cargo ships.

A glance at the map will show that from the Admiralty Islands, we can fly land-based bombers over a wide arc—northward toward Truk and eastward toward positions on New Britain and New Ireland still held by the Japs. We can fly land-based planes, too, toward Madang and Newak and the bases along the northern coast of New Guinea. Presently we will open up a supply line which will be virtually an inland waterway between Hawaii and the north coast of New Guinea and eventually the Philippines. Our transports carrying troops and supplies will be able to travel in ever increasing numbers toward the Philippines where we must some day concentrate. The present line of approach would seem to be heading toward the southernmost islands of the Philippines.

Coincidentally, the mid-Pacific operations of our Navy will be heading some day for the northernmost group of the Philippines. All this takes months and months of preparation and organization. MacArthur's idea all along has been to approach the Philippines from the south, but the counsel of naval strategists, who were better versed in the problems of naval warfare in the Pacific than the general, prevailed. It was deemed wiser to make sure of the Solomons and safeguard the supply line to the Solomons and then strike straight across the mid-Pacific to the bases and the Marshalls in a bold attempt to render valueless the Japanese holdings in the Truk and the Carolina Islands as well as in Guam and the Marianna Islands.

Viewpoints Merge.
Whatever impatience there may have been at MacArthur's headquarters last year, there is no doubt now that the Navy viewpoint and that of Gen. MacArthur has merged at last. The seizure of the Admiralty Islands is like effecting a junction between the two strategies or rather the two approaches. The chiefs of staffs have all along been united in their view—the Army and the Navy and the Air Force—as to just how the Pacific war should be fought and there is no doubt that if Gen. MacArthur had been in Washington all along and been a member of the chief of staffs he would have concurred. Indeed, after the main lines of strategy were fully developed, Gen. Marshall went to the south Pacific and filled in Gen. MacArthur on the details of what has since been consummated. It is a splendid example of unity of plan and command.

Thus while Gen. MacArthur personally witnessed the seizure of the Admiralty Islands and the communique was issued in his name, it was after all a naval operation—a sequel to the Navy's carefully developed strategy of the last two years. There will be many more

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U. S., Brazilian Aides Hail New Rubber Pact As Output Stimulus

He characterized it as a "culmination" of the policy agreed to by the signatories in the basic agreement of March 1942.

Continuation of such close co-operation between the United States and Latin American countries, Dr. Boucas predicted at a press luncheon, not only could prevent a post-war "economic collapse" but could pave the way for an "era of prosperity."

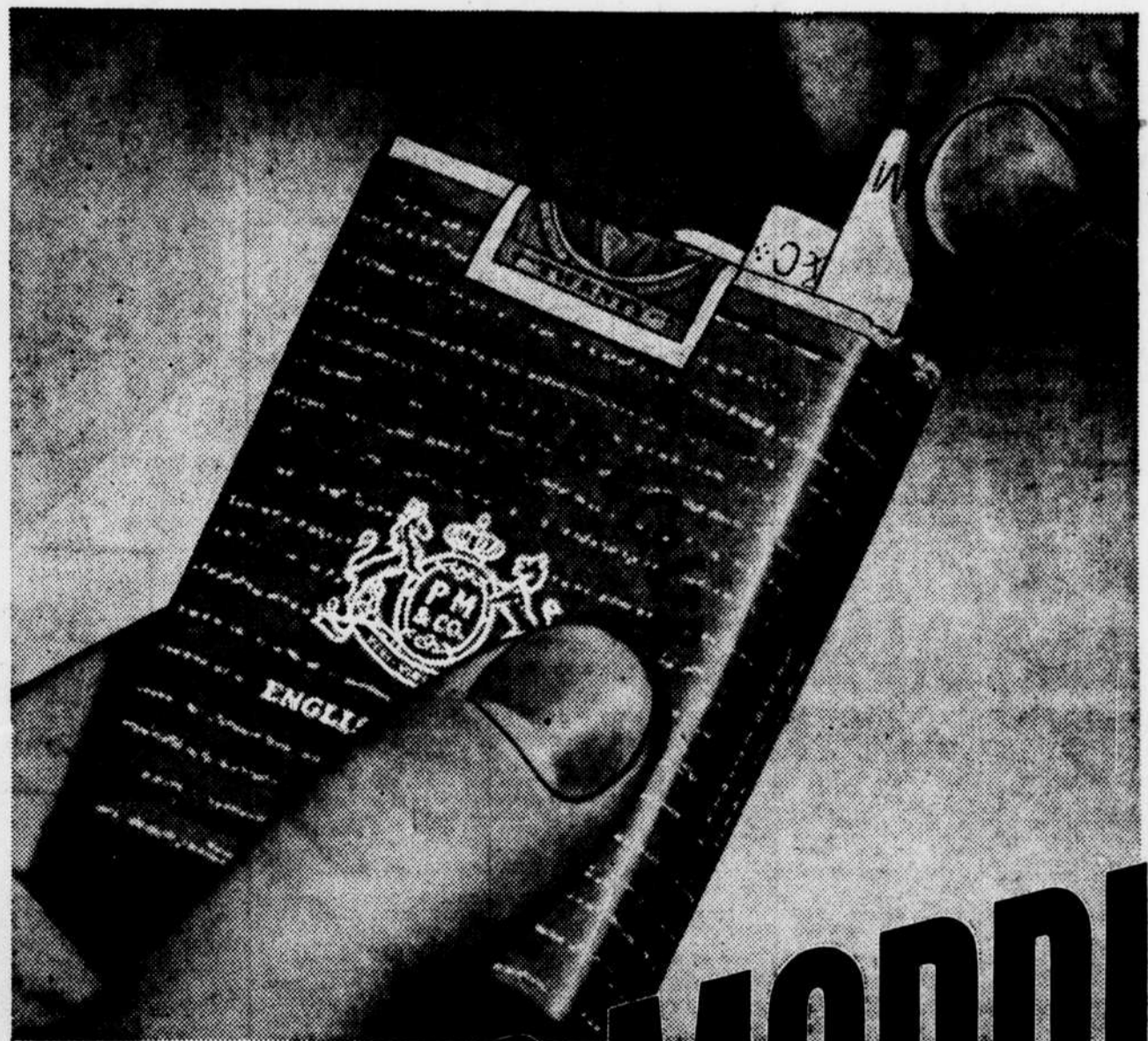

McCarran Promises Federal Bar Session To Guard Constitution

Declaring that various Government agencies seek to set aside fundamental conceptions of constitutional law and substitute legal ideologies, Senator McCarran, Democrat, of Nevada, new chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, yesterday pledged that his committee would resist any attempts to circumvent the Constitution.

Addressing the weekly meeting of the Federal Bar Association in Schneider's Restaurant, Senator McCarran called on the legal profession to maintain vigilance to see that constitutional law is not superseded by new concepts.

"Scarcely a month passes without some one advocating new methods of law application to by-pass obstacles," Senator McCarran declared.

The Senator saw a threat to the democratic form of government which would be the will of the Nation's courts be denied.

"Instead of tearing down our organic law structure, we should strengthen it, so that when our boys overseas return home they will thank us that we were warriors who remained at home to keep the fires of democracy burning," Senator McCarran said.

Among guests at the luncheon were Attorney General Francis Biddle, Justice Thurman Arnold and Justin Miller of the United States Court of Appeals, Justice Bolitha Laws of the Emergency Court of Appeals, Judges George D. Nelson, John P. McMahon and Walter P. Barse of Municipal Court, and United States Attorney Edward M. Curran.

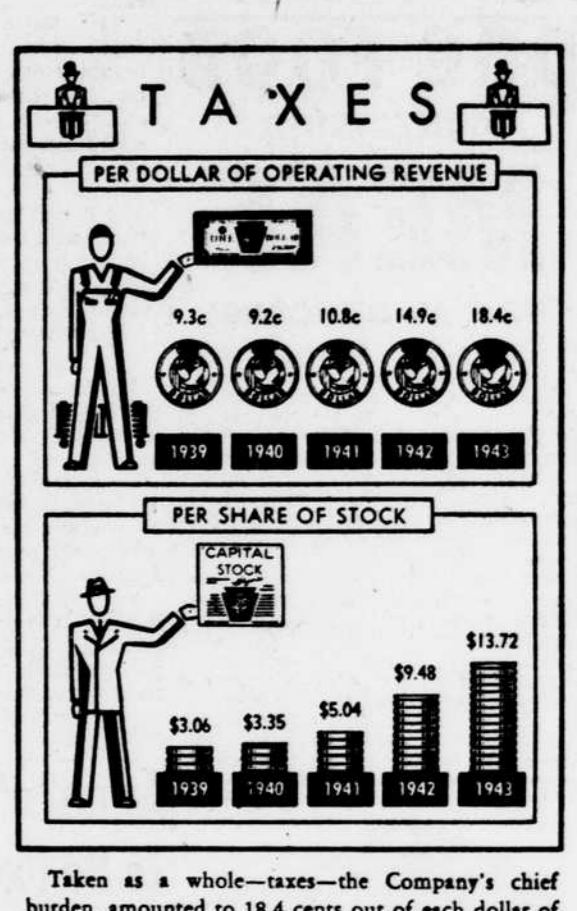

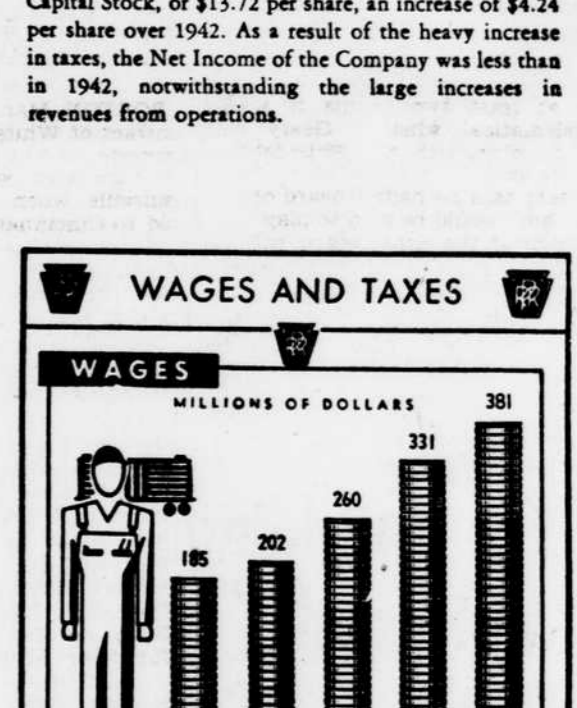

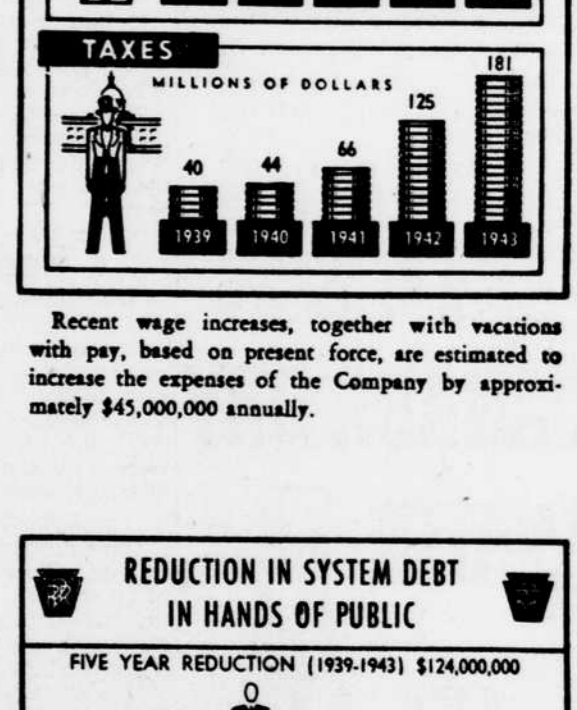

Mr. Goodykoontz, who had served two terms as the 5th district representative from the 5th district, from 1918 to 1922, suffered a broken hip in a hunting accident last October 11. Since then he had been confined to hospitals here and in Huntington and Cincinnati.

Wolcott Proposes Three Changes Before Renewing OPA Act

By the Associated Press. The Office of Price Administration today became the perimeter of another brewing battle in Congress as Representative Wolcott, Republican, of Michigan, opened a drive to bring about sweeping revisions in the OPA Act before its expiration on June 30. He announced he would seek these major changes: 1. Insertion of a new section outlawing consumer food subsidies.

The Salvage-for-Victory Program in Washington, which was resumed October 15 by the various parent-teacher and home and school associations in cooperation with The Evening Star, has yielded nearly 3,000,000 pounds of waste paper, most of which has left Washington for a paper mill on the same day it was collected at the schools.

Big Surplus in Sight. Mr. Boeschstein reported that a surplus of 32,329 tons of newsprint appears in sight for the first 1944 quarter, but said this does not take into account stocks that were lent by large papers to smaller ones in certain permitted increases in publishers' reserves which have been approved but not made.

Award of 'Oscars' To Be Made Tonight

By the Associated Press. HOLLYWOOD, Mar. 2.—The motion picture industry will pass out the laurels tonight to its members whose achievements during the past 12 months it deems the most outstanding. The occasion is the merit awards session of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. Because of war conditions it is being held in a theater for the first time in its 16-year history instead of in a banquet hall. The customary statues the winners receive will be of gilded plastic instead of gold.

Baltimore Induction Center Moved to Fort Meade

By the Associated Press. BALTIMORE, Mar. 2.—The transfer of the induction station at the 5th Regiment Armory in Baltimore to the recruit reception center at Fort George G. Meade was announced today by the 3d Service Command. Under previous procedure, men called up for induction were sworn in the same day they took their final physical examinations, and during the 21 days before they reported to Fort Meade. The final examinations for Maryland inductees still will be given at the armory in Baltimore, but the men will not be sworn in until they report at the Fort Meade induction station.

Army Plans to Set Up Center to Treat Blind

An Army center for rehabilitation of all blinded servicemen, as well as prisoners of war, is to be established soon, probably somewhere in the East, Secretary of War Stimson announced today. Under an agreement among the Army, Navy, War Manpower Commission and Veterans' Administration, the Army will establish the center for blinded veterans of all the armed services. It will be directed by Col. Frederic Thorne, eye specialist now on duty at Valley Forge General Hospital, Phoenixville, Pa. Mr. Stimson said that so far 73 men have been totally blinded in the war, 70 in the Army and 3 in the Navy and Marine Corps. In addition, 2 blinded German prisoners are under care in this country. The servicemen will be given special social and economic adjustment training before being released by the armed forces. The Red Cross is the only service organization working with servicemen in Iceland.

Fly Calls on House For 'Prompt Hearing' On FCC Situation

By the Associated Press. Chairman James L. Fly of the Federal Communications Commission has renewed his request for a "prompt hearing" for commission witnesses before the House committee investigating the FCC. The committee itself is currently split over questions of procedure and has not been meeting recently. One committee member, Representative Wigglesworth, Republican, of Massachusetts, charged in the House Tuesday that "political coercion" had been brought to bear in an effort to block the investigators. He demanded the resignation of Chairman Lea unless the inquiry is resumed and pushed "regardless of pressure from the administration or any other source." Mr. Lea heatedly denied he had been subjected to pressure of any sort. Mr. Fly in a letter to Mr. Lea stated yesterday that "throughout a full year of investigation" the members and staff of this commission have stood ready to appear and to testify to the complete record of the commission's policies, decisions and actions and asked for the opportunity "to offer the complete facts" on FCC's work.

District Drivers Will Get 10 Pct. More Tires in March

An increase of approximately 10 per cent in the number of new tires available to District passenger car and motorcycle owners during March was announced yesterday by the OPA. The quota for this month is 2,449 grade 1 tires as compared with 2,207 offered for sale in February, the OPA reveals. The used, or grade 3, tire quota was increased from 1,300 last month to 1,503 for March, an increase of about 15 per cent. A slight increase was noted in tubes. Bus and truck tire quotas were increased from a total of 914 in February to 943 this month, and tubes in the same category showed a proportionate increase. Distribution of the new tires will be handled on an occupational basis by local War Price and Rationing Boards, it was stated. Car owners working in the most essential occupations will be given preference. OPA officials declared. Commercial vehicle quotas have been divided for the first time, with separate allotments of large and small size tires to be made by the local boards.

Second Attempt Made To Wreck Train After Arrest of 2 Boys

By the Associated Press. BOSTON, Mar. 2.—A second attempt since Monday to derail Boston and Albany trains in nearby Natick—one the fast Southwestern Limited and the other a local—was averted last night when railroad employees discovered a boulder and tie on the westbound tracks. The obstruction to the local was discovered not long after two 14-year-old boys confessed to E. A. Soucy, agent in charge of the FBI's Boston office, that they had put a tie on the Southwestern Limited tracks Monday night to "see what would happen." The boulder and tie placed on the local track last night were removed before any damage was done. Railroad officials said that an alert car inspector who spotted a piece of a tie in the cowcatcher of the limited, bound from Boston to

St. Louis, averted a possible tragedy which might have involved the lives of hundreds of west-bound passengers. Mr. Soucy said the limited was about 25 minutes out of Boston when it hit the railroad tie. One half of the tie lodged in the cowcatcher and was being pushed along by the pony wheels when the inspector observed it and flagged the train to an emergency stop. After obtaining assurances of Natick police that they would prosecute the boys in juvenile court, United States Attorney Edmund J. Brandon said that because of their youth he would not prefer charges under the wartime sabotage statutes. Building Ship Big Job; Takes 87,000 Phone Calls. SEATTLE—It takes a lot of talk nowadays to build a destroyer. The Seattle-Tacoma Shipbuilding Corp., with help of the telephone company, figured it takes 87,000 telephone calls, both outside and local connections, before construction is completed on one of the destroyers. The information was compiled in an effort to stop unnecessary calls through the shipyard switchboard.

Passengers Bruised In Southern Derailment

By the Associated Press. GOLDSBORO, N. C., Mar. 2.—Sixty-two of a Southern Railway train bound from Goldsboro to Greensboro were derailed yesterday at a grade crossing near Princeton, 20 miles west of here. A number of passengers were shaken up and bruised. They were taken to Selma by bus while workmen repaired the track.

Dr. Black Expected To Leave Farm Credit For Near East Post

By the Associated Press.

Dr. A. G. Black is expected to resign soon as governor of the Farm Credit Administration in another personnel change involving the departure of Vice President Wallace from top-ranking Federal farm posts.

Friends said yesterday Dr. Black, who came to Washington in 1933 to head the section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, would relinquish his farm credit post soon to take another with an economic mission to the Near East.

Each departure has been followed by reports that Secretary of Agriculture Wickard would be the next to go. Reports that the Secretary would quit started bobbing up last year when he was replaced by Chester C. Davis, St. Louis banker, as war food administrator.

The personnel changes in the farm set-up have followed a general pattern. In each case the person leaving has been replaced by an appointee described as more conservative. Recent elections have reflected a farm belt swing away from the Democrats.

Two persons are mentioned in agricultural circles as possible successors to Dr. Black. They are I. O. Duggan, deputy governor of the Farm Credit Administration, and Albert S. Goss, master of the National Grange.

Mr. Duggan has strong support among Southern Democrats who have been critical of some farm programs. Mr. Goss served for a time as Federal Land Bank commissioner under Dr. Black, but resigned in protest against farm credit policies of Dr. Black and Mr. Wallace.



Bethesda Flyer Killed On Eve of Parents' Visit

The death of Lt. John F. Ligon, Jr., of Bethesda, Md., in the crash of a Flying Fortress near Tampa, Fla., on Tuesday, preceded by one day an anticipated reunion with his parents, it was revealed last night.

Mr. and Mrs. John F. Ligon of Ligon Knoll, Old Georgetown road, were en route to their son's post at MacDill Field, Fla., when they learned of the plane accident in which Lt. Ligon and eight other Army airmen lost their lives. Last night they were on their way back to Washington from Hollywood, Fla.



Lt. Ligon, 25, was co-pilot of the Flying Fortress which crashed 25 miles northwest of Tampa. He had been in the Air Forces a year and a day. He was a graduate of Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School and George Washington University, where he was a member of Sigma Chi Fraternity. Prior to his enlistment he was associated with his father in the interior decorating business.

RCAF Flyer Missing; Wife Worked Here

Flying Officer Roy McGregor, whose wife has been working for the British Supply Mission here, has been listed as missing in action on a Royal Canadian Air Force casualty list, according to an Associated Press report from Ottawa.

Mrs. McGregor came to Washington about three months ago, and was living at 7710 Blair road N.W. She returned to Canada when her husband was reported missing.

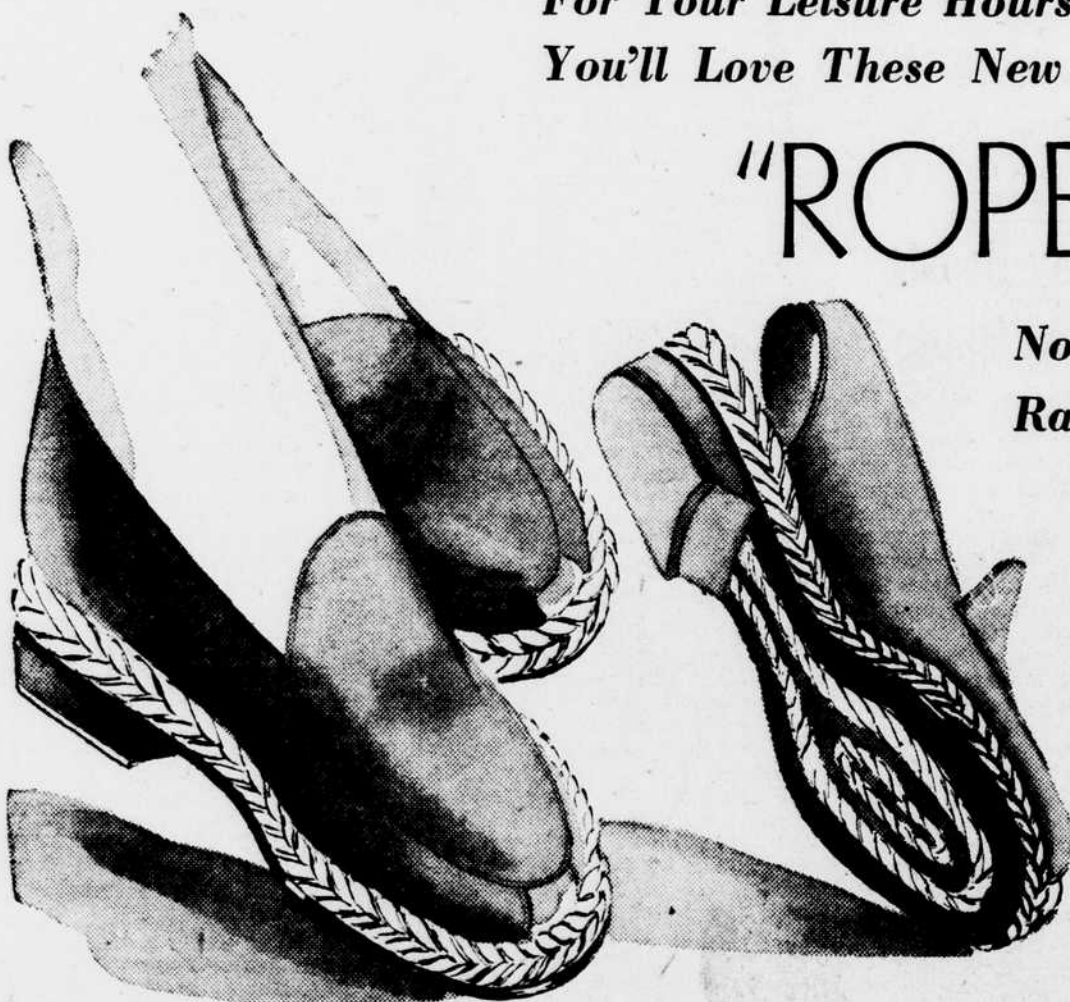

Back From the Wars

D. C. Marine Describes Waiting For Invasion That Didn't Come

Pfc. Herbert F. Brooks, 21, Marine Corps radioman, was at his post in the underground radio station on Guadalcanal. Reconnaissance planes flashed a message. The Jap fleet was moving down past Munda.

"We figured we were in for another invasion," said Pvt. Brooks who is on furlough at his home, 715 Taylor street N.W. "Every body stood by PT boats and planes were on the alert."



That was 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Toward dusk a wave of Japanese planes swarmed over. At dark the Japanese fleet moved in. By morning it had steamed away. Its mission had been completed. The Japanese troops had been evacuated.

"That night of the evacuation was pretty hectic," said Pvt. Brooks. "We had been waiting for an invasion all night, and it wasn't until morning we realized they were moving out."

Trained as Flyer. Trained in Jacksonville, Fla., to be a flyer radioman, Pvt. Brooks found himself on a ground station during his six months on Guadalcanal. It was a disappointment, he said, but he was always in the middle of the excitement.

Reconnaissance planes radioed movements of the Jap fleet and planes. Pvt. Brooks was among those who relayed their position to the PT boats and patrol planes. By December, 1942, Japanese resistance was weakening. Food and medical supplies were landed haphazardly. Wooden crates were tossed overboard from transports and surfaced submarines to float in with the tide.

"In addition to doing a wonderful job of protecting the marines," Pvt. Brooks remarked, "the PT boats were pretty smart about intercepting supplies before they floated to shore. For a while we ate Jap rice."

His first overseas action is the one recalled most vividly by Pvt. Brooks. He landed on Armistice Day, 1942. At the same time the

Japanese were reinforcing their lines on the other end of the island. "The transport was sent into the harbor," Pvt. Brooks recalled. "About two miles from shore she took a bomb hit—the first I had ever experienced. They quickly batted down the hatches. We stayed down in the hold until the first wave of dive bombers disappeared."

"Then we hit the beach. A second wave of heavy bombers swarmed over. I was directed to the radio station, built well underground by the Navy Seabees.

"We could hear the bombs and feel the concussion," he said. "Al-

ways the topic of conversation while we were on watch was whether or not it would stand a direct hit. One never came, so we never knew."

Pvt. Brooks recovered from malaria, which he said was "common as a cold," just before returning to the United States. On his next overseas assignment he would like to go to the European theater. Or as an alternative he would like to take a special course in radio repair work.

A senior at Central High School, Pvt. Brooks enlisted in the marines shortly before his graduation, after the Pearl Harbor attack. His mother, Naomi Brooks, lives at the Taylor street address.

6-Star Admiral Plan Reflects Capital's Awareness of Rank

By HELEN LOMBARD.

Washington always has been rank and title conscious, a fact that alternately has amused, irritated and interested the rest of the country. Protocol and precedence and rows over who sits where are characteristic of the Capital.

Precedence, this time in the military line, once more has come to the fore with the announcement that the House Naval Affairs Committee has approved creation of the title of admiral of the Navy, a six-star rank.

The chief reason advanced for adding more stars and stripes to the naval rating is that American military officials are outranked in their discussions with foreign military representatives. This argument has caused some skeptical comment from members of Congress who profess to see no merit in additional "scrambled eggs" on the visors of admirals. It has, however, a factual basis. Admirals William D. Leahy and Ernest J. King, the ranking American naval men in Washington, both are outranked by their British colleagues when they gather at the conferences of the combined chiefs of staff.

Field Marshal Sir John Dill, Admiral Sir Percy Noble and Air Marshal Sir William Welsh are the top dignitaries. This does not mean, of course, that a British decision would prevail, purely as a matter of rank, over a decision of the Americans. Rank does, however, have its importance. Our Allies demand with politeness and firmness that it be respected. Military men all over the world are trained to respect rank and it is difficult for them to discount it in discussions with foreign military personalities.

Even in the days when the U. S. S. R. refused to recognize the military classifications which prevailed in the capitalistic states, the Soviet military representatives in Washington were obliged to recognize the importance of rank.

The first Soviet Military Attaché in Washington, Comrade Vladimir Burdin, was a carpenter by profession. Under Soviet regulations he was rated as staff officer, second grade. While here he promoted himself to the rank of lieutenant general in order to be able to meet on equal grounds the Naval Military Attaché Lt. Gen. von Boetticher.

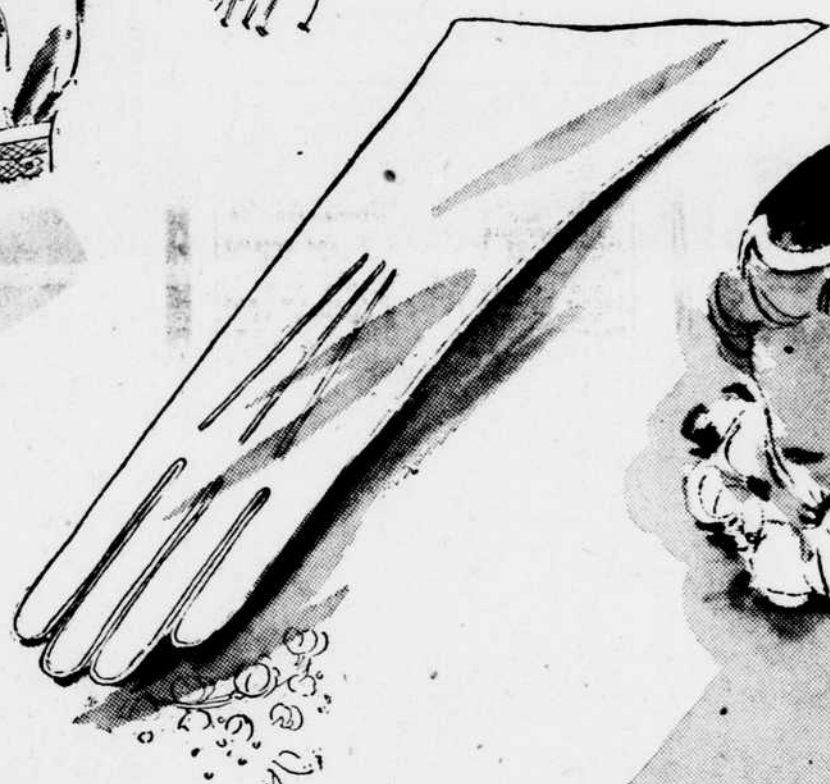

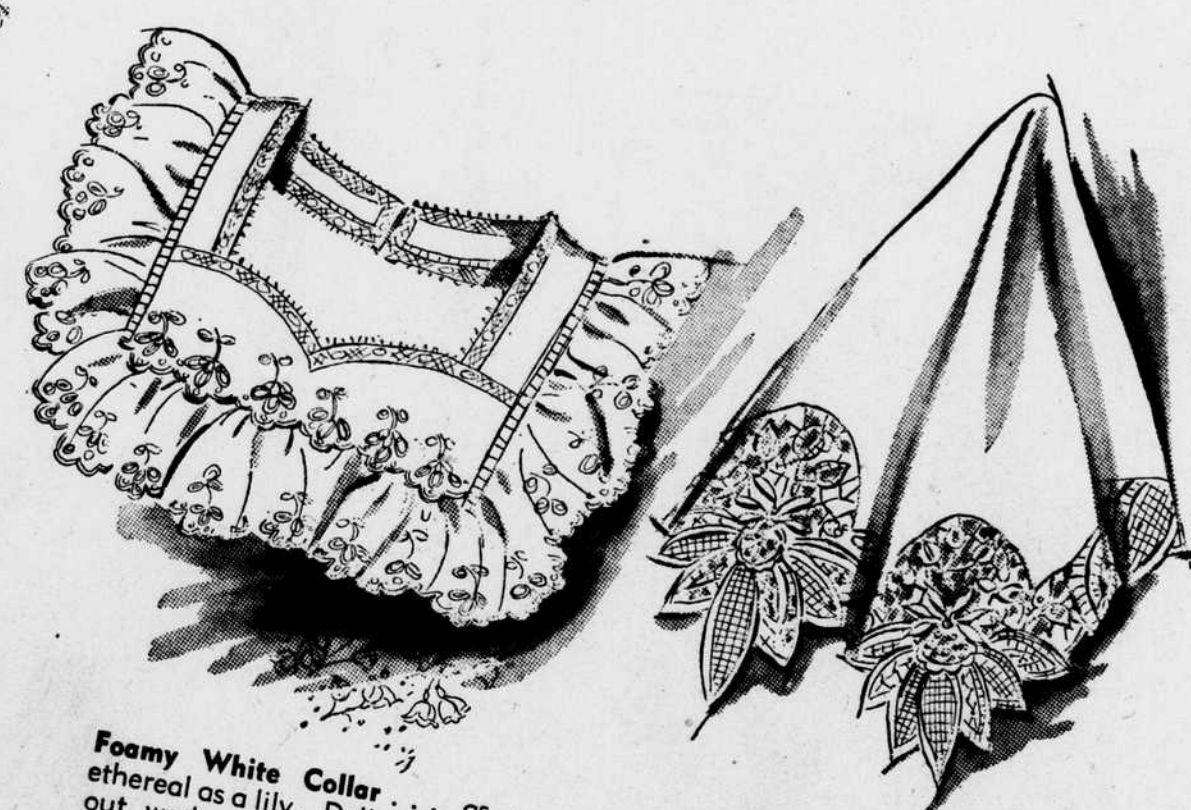

'Lure' of War Plants For Mothers Assailed At Conference Here

The enactment of a law to "enforce employers to cease inducing mothers to work in industry" was urged yesterday by Mrs. William Berry of Greensboro, N. C., known as the "American Mother of 1942".

Declaring that today industry has taken precedence over the home, Mrs. Berry, the mother of 13 children, speaking before the Family Life Conference of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, said we should enhance the prestige of the mother in the home rather than glamorize the woman at the steel works.

She attacked the day nursery as an inadequate substitution for the home, but admitted that it was better than "abandoning great numbers to wander through the streets."

War Contracts Blamed. The Rev. Paul Tanner, director of the youth department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, who spoke on "In Defense of Chastity," said that the concentration of war contracts in certain parts of the country was responsible in a large measure for the number of mothers in industry. He suggested that the War Production Board more equally distribute war contracts in order to employ all available single women before calling on mothers.

Judge Joy Seth Hurd of the Court of Common Pleas of Cuyahoga County, Ohio, also a principal speaker during yesterday sessions of the three-day conference, said that "the participation of wives and mothers in industry" is a major factor in the "increase in the divorce tempo" today.

As an aid in solving the divorce problem, he suggested the reform and uniformity of State divorce laws. He cited as his ideal the law of South Carolina, where "absolute divorce is not allowed by constitutional provision and custody of the children depends entirely upon what the court considers for their best interest."

Shaw Defines Delinquency. Defining juvenile delinquency as "any anti-social behavior which the community cannot tolerate," G. Howland Shaw, Assistant Secretary of State, declared that such delinquency was caused in the main by neglect, "the feeling that no one cares a rap what you do or don't do"; the "over-protected youngster" who is not prepared for life and spoiled by affection, and the "institutionalized" child who has had no normal family existence.

"Preaching does no good," he asserted, "and the way religion is presented to delinquents is a lemon."

While "Catholic circles look upon it with a certain measure of

suspicion because of materialism and determinism," Mr. Shaw declared that modern psychiatry had made "enormous" progress in the field of juvenile delinquency. "It has re-enforced, although in a different nomenclature, our Catholic view of the fundamental importance of the family."

Other Speakers Listed. Other speakers at the conference yesterday included: Mrs. Dennis V. Renault, president of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, Diocese of St. Augustine, who spoke on "We Must Educate for Parenthood"; Joseph P. McMurray, postwar division of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, "Enough for All"; the Rev. Raymond McGowan, assistant director of the Social Action Department, "Economic Security for the Family," and the Rev. John F. Cronin, St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, "The Family is the Natural Unit of Economic Security."

Youth sessions on "What the School and Parish Can Do to Assist Youth in Preparing for Marriage and Family Life," and "What the Home and Young Persons Individually Can Do to Prepare for Marriage and Family Life" will be conducted today in the chemistry auditorium at Catholic University under the sponsorship of the National Federation of Catholic College Students.

Recommendations at the conclusion of today's sessions of the conference will be presented by Bishop Joseph P. Hurley of Florida, for the preparations and policies of a national family week to be held sometime in May.

Delinquency Blamed On Parents' Failure To Set Example

Much of the country's juvenile delinquency was blamed by Mrs. Helen F. Southard, personal and family relations secretary of the national YWCA, yesterday, on the failure of parents to set an example of ideal human relationship in the home.

Mrs. Southard told members of the Girl Reserve Mothers' Council at a meeting in the YWCA that "we have pinned too many things on the war." She added that many problems of the adolescent were beginning to take form before the war. Stating that community life is becoming meaningless to young people and a lack of routine characterizes the present-day home, Mrs. Southard urged closer co-operation between families, schools, social

agencies and young people themselves in meeting the problem.

She also advocated a "campaign for mental health" to teach parents and children the fundamentals of good citizenship, greater participation of schools in guiding adolescents to study and analyze their own problems.

Mrs. Southard summed up the problems of the teen-age groups under four general headings: The choosing of a vocation "to help organize their lives after some definite problems"; learning how to handle emotions, developing an independence from the family unit and working out a pattern relationship with the community.

Mrs. William N. Vincent, council president, who presided at yesterday's meeting, expressed the opinion that much of Washington's difficulty with adolescents arose from lack of discipline in junior and senior high school resulting from a rapid turnover in teachers.

District Flyer's Role On First Mission In Europe Is Grim

UNITED STATES HEAVY BOMBER STATION IN ENGLAND, Feb. 16.—A rough introduction to the kind of war where the guns are shooting was that of Lt. A. Edwin Stern, jr., 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Abram E. Stern, 3101 Chesapeake street N.W. He was navigator-bombardier on a Flying Fortress on one raid over Kiel where the flak gunners had such a deadly aim the Yanks called them "postgraduates of Paris."

At an altitude of 26,000 feet, Lt. Stern, who was a cub reporter for both the Post and Times-Herald, had to take turns with the waist gunner his first time out on a mission. They were giving artificial respiration to a turret gunner who was dead all the time. The dead man had lost his oxygen mask.

Lt. Stern had to part with his own mask for the man, relying himself on a "walk-around bottle" which soon would be exhausted. He and the waist gunner took turns at artificial respiration, one taking over as the other became exhausted. It was possible to work only a few minutes at a time.

Plane Flies Lower.

Learning of the situation the pilot broke formation and brought the ship down to a lower altitude where an oxygen supply would not be necessary. But it was impossible to revive the turret gunner, who probably had been dead since they first found him. Lt. Stern had shortly before reported for duty at this station and had had to take the place of a regular bombardier who was sick.

The flak in the Ruhr is supposed to be very bad. That around Paris is a little worse. But the boys seem to think that the best gunners are a ways taken away from the Paris area and sent to the defenses at Kiel.

Since then Lt. Stern has been on three other raids. The worst was over Frankfurt, which was bombed through a heavy cloud cover, and where, Lt. Stern says, "we ran into the most flak I have ever seen."

Another bombardier in the same outfit is Lt. Norman Rasmussen of Indianhead, Md., who has just finished five missions over occupied Europe. The worst of these was over Frankfurt when Lt. Rasmussen's craft was peppered full of holes by flak. There were at least 20 hits and one big, jagged hole in a wing near one of the engines. Two flak balls exploded under the ball turret. The hit on the wing rocked the plane and, Lt. Rasmussen says "sounded like a very happy beat on a drum."

But the plane's troubles had really only started. After making the bomb run over the target it was attacked by enemy fighters. Says Lt. Rasmussen:

"I saw another B-17 go down right in front of me and suddenly explode in the air. I took my eyes off it for a second and there were four FWs staring me right in the face. One had his nose pointed straight at me and came up directly underneath. His position was such that I couldn't hit him, but he couldn't do anything either. He just rolled over quickly and disappeared. The other fighters were engaged by the group just ahead and I don't know what happened to them."

Lt. Rasmussen's first mission was over the difficult target of Wilhelmshafen, which was bombed from 28,000 feet through a very heavy cloud cover which calls for the use of specialized techniques on the part of the bombardier.

Staff Sergt. Elias M. Johnson, former Washington Star agent at Culpeper, Va., now in the same outfit, has completed eight missions in the past three months, including particularly difficult ones over Ludwigs-hafen and Brunswick. He is a radio operator. His most thrilling experience was over Bremen when the ball turret gunner's oxygen mask froze up and he passed out cold. Sergt. Johnson had to give up his own mask for the unconscious man and rely on a "walk-around bottle." All that was at 46 below zero.

Lt. Stern, a Central High graduate, was a student at George Washington University when he enlisted the day after the attack on Pearl Harbor. He has been in England since November and in a letter received by his parents Tuesday he said he had talked to Mr. Henry.

An equally touching characterization is that of Susy Prim, the wonderful Froment daughter who has sense of duty to her family has always been too deep and unselfish to permit of marriage. In two wars she is a nurse and to each of them she brings a sense of love and responsibility that earn her devotion.

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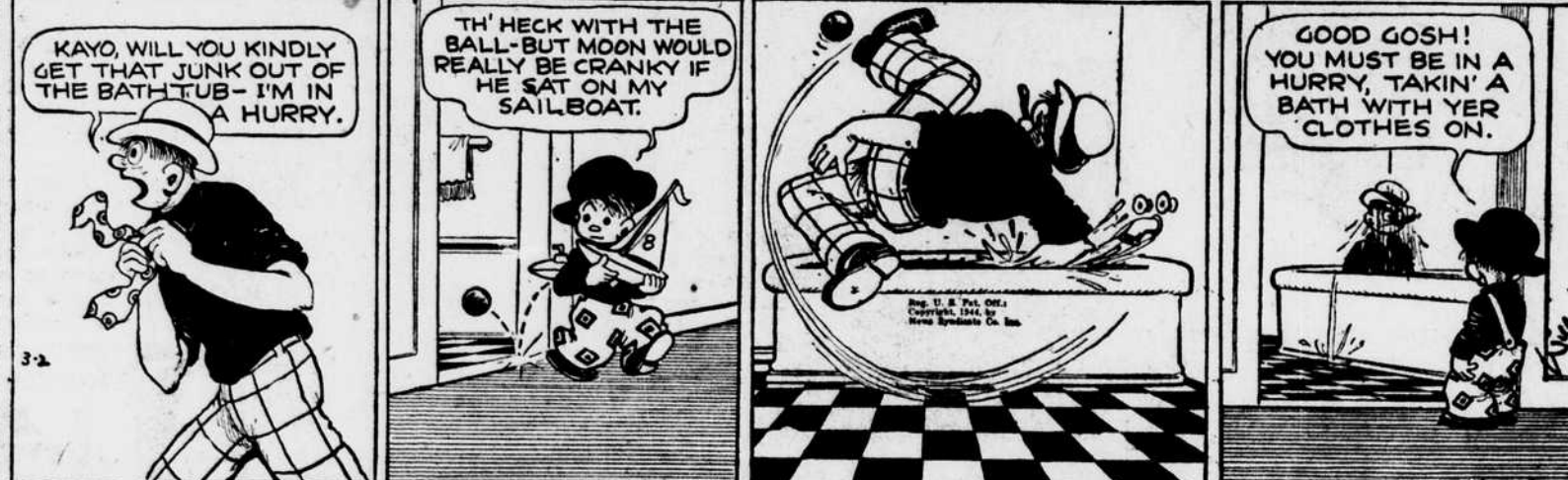
